



I might add that Mrs. Stancil further informs me that many of the doors of the buildings have been torn from their hinges and much disorder has been created within by vandals. Beyond the tables and benches mentioned above you are aware, no doubt, of the fact that most of the plants which were valued at \$3,066.00 have been stolen. This request has necessitated a review of your file and we give below a brief resume of our administration of your affairs.

As you know, the policies in regard to the management and subsequent liquidation of your property were decided upon by the Government of Canada, and while the problem was a difficult one for all concerned, we can assure you that it has been the aim of this office to carry out those policies in as caroful and fair a manner as possible.

Real Property: The Real Property declared by you, consisting of 2 vacant lets in the Saanich district of Vancouver Island, (Cat. 879), was sold (Apr. 13/46) for \$150,00, as advised you at the time (Apr. 15/46), a complete statement of the transaction being mailed to you on August 28th, 1946.

Personal Property: You declared (March 28th, 1942) emership, in partnership with your brother (Rensuke TAKATA, Reg. No. 10057, File 1422), of the buildings situated on the property known as the Japanese Tea Gardens in Gorge Park, Victoria, together with the Foontents of the buildings.

A proper inventory of the contents of the buildings was made by the Custodian's agent on the 21st April, 1942, and on the 29th March, 1943, these goods were removed by this office to central storage at The Willows as it was found impossible under war-time conditions to afford proper protection in such isolated situation as the Gorge Parks

All goods stored at The Willows were sold at a large well-advertised public auction held there on the 18th December, 1944, the not proceeds realized for your goods being \$440.89, as per auction sheets sent to your brother on the 21st June, 1945.

The removal by Mr. Bailey of Colwood, Island Highway, of a number of shrubs and plants put an end to the gradual loss of these garden plants from petty thisving. We wrote you to this effect on the 2nd June, 1944, adding that,

September 21st, 1946. unless we heard from you to the contrary, we would assume that Mr. Balley's custody of the plants had your approval, and therefore would not be disturbed by this office. This will leave no belance in your account, which will therefore be closed. This would appear to account for all property of every kind left by you in the protected area which vested in the Custodian, and in order that you may confirm this, we enclose a stamped addressed envelope for your convenience.
