

in a letter received on December 18, 1942, from Unosuke Sakamoto, File No. 4933, he states that some of his friends' chattels were stored in his house, and mentions the Kimura family.

All goods removed from Sakamoto's house were done so under his name and it was impossible for us to identify the owners, therefore, what could not be identified as Unosuke Sakamoto's has been transferred to Suspense Account and may include the household effects belonging to Kazuo Kimura.

Four fishing nets were identified as belonging to Kazuo Kimura and sold for the total amount of \$207.50. Nets that were inventoried in his name under Custodian Nos. 11, 12, 14 & 18 are missing.

"These houses have all been broken into and ransacked thoroughly. We picked up small stuff on the 4th & 5th, but when we came to move on the 6th the small stuff had been well pilfered."

It is impossible for this office to identify the chattels sold, therefore, we have transferred the funds derived from these sales to Suspense Account so that this may be dealt with at a later date.






