

This file reveals the above owned no real property in any protected area of B.C. and did not carry any Fire Insurance.

CHATELS:

The above, who made his declaration to the Custodian on April 8/42 and was evacuated on April 14/42, declared chattels as shown on Chattel Schedule on file, at the Brunswick Cannery.

In accordance with a request contained in Custodian release dated July 13/43, the washing machine and the typewriter were shipped, but apparently not the boxes, books and records he asked for. A further Custodian release was received on Dec. 23/43 asking for the records, net twine, three boxes (no numbers given), picture without frame and carpenter tools in box, and one big black box. These were shipped on March 27/44 as per memo on file of that date.

It will be noted that lumber sold for \$40.00 was originally credited to the above, but as he did not declare it and his brother Yukinori did, this credit was transferred to the account of Yukinori. A hand saw and motor, also credited to the above, has been transferred to the account of Yukinori for the same reason.

Practically all items declared have been accounted for with the exception of a Singer sewing machine, 2 scales. A kitchen range inventoried by us was not sold, and I note that in an excerpt from Mr. Robinsons files, that a sawdust burner was apparently loaned to Cpl. Watts, who probably has it still. This could be the kitchen range inventoried by us.

The remaining chattels were disposed of as shown on Chattel Schedule for the net sum of \$103.72 and this sum credited to the account of the above with this office.

Mr. Jacobson, of the Brunswick Cannery, Ladner, advises us in his letter of April 18/46 that he has a chesterfield suite belonging to the above and he wishes us to ship this suite to Yukio TAKASAKI as soon as possible. - *Shipped Oct 30/46*

The above declared a Marine engine. Report on file from appraiser R.G. Ransford, advises that he considers this machine entirely valueless and that it could only be sold for junk. This was advertised by public tender in both newspapers and the advertising costs in the sums of \$5.40 and \$3.12 respectively were deducted from the account of the above with this office.

SPECIFIED ARTICLES:

According to information supplied to this office the above was the registered owner of a fishing vessel the "H.Y." which was sold through the Japanese Fishing Vessel Disposal Committee for the net sum of \$368.75, and this sum was paid to the Custodian and credited to the account of the above. Full details are given on Specified Articles Summary on file.

The above was also the registered owner of a fishing vessel the "Taka #4" which was sold through the Japanese Fishing Vessel Disposal Committee for the net sum of \$1,034.50 and this sum was paid to Yukio TAKASAKI on April 10/42. Full details are given on Specified Articles Summary on file.

VICTORY BOND: The above declared a \$50.00 Victory Bond in his own possession. This was not brought under the control of the Custodian.

BANK ACCOUNT: The above declared a savings account in the Royal Bank of Canada at Steveston in the sum of \$20.00; an account with the Japan and Canada Trust in the sum of \$10.00, and one in the Bank of Montreal, Main and Hastings S.s., Vancouver, in the sum of \$10.00. None of these were brought under the control of the Custodian. (No account with Japan & Canada as at Dec.-42 so must have withdrawn this before evacuation).

LIFE INSURANCE: The above declared a policy with the Sun Life Co. in the sum of \$1000.00, and two with the Monarch Life Insurance Co., one for \$1500.00 and one for \$1000.00, all in his own possession. None of these were brought under the control of the Custodian.

No property interests other than those mentioned above are found on this file.

MEMORANDUM

TO: Mr. B. Good

Re: Case No. 760 - Yukio TAKASAKI and
Mr. Virtue's letter of July 16, 1949.

The claimant and his brother, with their respective families, lived together at Steveston. The brother did not enter a claim, and review of their files denotes that Claimant is claiming for both his own chattels and his brother's. No Power of Attorney to so claim is on file, nor was the claim presented as being a joint claim, therefore a great number of the chattels had to be of necessity placed under "No Record", whereas consideration might have been given to them if the claim had not been submitted as a personal claim of the Claimant.

FISHING VESSEL:

Sold by J.F.V.D.C., the Custodian merely signing the Bill of Sale when the Claimant refused. (See Transcript Page 9, Lines 5 - 26). ✓

NETS \$32.32

Claimant's brother declared 6 nets, 3 of which were found, sold and the proceeds credited to the declarant. As the Claimant never declared nets, it is considered that he is attempting to include these items in his claim as the brother (Yukinori TAKASAKI, File 4184) has not entered a claim.

The Nets will be placed in "No Record" in spite of Exhibit No. 9, as it is considered by the writer that the mere mention of nets in that Exhibit does not constitute a declaration.

LUMBER \$75.00

Not declared by Claimant, but declared by brother, appraised, sold at appraised price and proceeds credited to brother.

While Counsel for the Claimant drew from the Claimant that the lumber purchase was a ~~joint~~ purchase by the two brothers, he went further and had the Claimant state that the lumber was in two separate piles with each brother having his own pile on his own particular pile. Also that they intended using the lumber for building "one" speedboat.

As the foregoing is patently ridiculous, and as the lumber found was credited to the declarant (Claimant's brother), this item is being placed in "E.I.C."

See Transcript Page 8, Line 15 to Page 9, Line 4, and Page 16, Line 10 to Line 28.

TOOLS \$250.00

Claimant never at any time declared Tools, but his brother declared same on his JP Form.

August 3, 1949.

The Claimant requisitioned the Tools on December 15, 1943 (Exhibit No. 8 (b)) and they were shipped to him on March 27, 1944 (See Master File 1576), as both the Claimant and his brother were c/o H. R. Hunt, Iron Springs, Alberta.

Claimant's Counsel (Transcript Page 6, Line 17 to Page 7, Line 8) produced a letter from the Claimant's brother to Claimant, wherein the brother states that the Tools and a Bandsaw belong to the Claimant even though he himself declared them. Government Counsel requested the date of the letter but it was conveniently undated and Mr. Rice regrettably did not pursue the question of its date of origin. In the opinion of the writer the ink was not quite dry at date of the Hearing as it is doubtful that the Jap would use the word "declare(d)" which appears in the text, nor would he have considered it necessary at that date to write such a note.

The Tools, therefore, are held by this office to have been the property of the Claimant's brother regardless of the spontaneous gesture above-referred to, and as such are being placed in "E.I.C."

See Transcript Page 6, Line 15 to Page 7, Line 8, and Page 7, Line 29 to Page 8, Line 14.

BANDSAW \$80.00

The Bandsaw was declared by Claimant's brother, auctioned by the Custodian and the proceeds credited to the declarant (Claimant's brother).

Claimant's Counsel's letter re Tools, etc., covers, and this item is being placed in "E.I.C."

ITEMS OF BOAT EQUIPMENT.

These items are all "No Record", were never declared by Claimant or his brother, never requisitioned or mentioned by either in their many letters, and no award or compromise should be considered.

If they could remember to declare items one-fifth their value, it is reasonable to assume that these would not have been forgotten. Government Counsel submits that they were the equipment on the various boats sold, even though the Claimant (Page 13, Line 26 to Page 14, Line 30) disputes the assertion.

Items of boat equipment are included in "Chattels, Misc." due to the Claimant testifying that they were stock-in-trade.

A new Analysis of Claim is attached hereto, plus a new Award Sheet to cover, and it is suggested that D. T. Braidwood forward one of each to Virtue when answering his letter.





YUKIO TAKASAKI, the claimant herein,
being first duly sworn, testified
through the Interpreter as follows:

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Do you speak English?

A Just a little bit.

Q Perhaps you can get along without the interpreter.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. RUSSELL:

10 Q Mr. Takasaki, I am showing you a summary of
evidence in support of claim? A: Yes.

Q And I am showing you the particulars of this
summary of evidence, and your signature on the
last page. Is that your signature?

A Yes.

Q You are familiar with the contents of this
summary of evidence? A: Yes.

Q You are familiar with these figures and so on
contained in this summary of evidence, is that right?

20 A Yes.

Q And to the best of your knowledge, information and
belief these particulars are correct, is that
correct? A: Yes.

Q And you caused this to be prepared from information
and figures supplied by yourself?

A Yes.

MR. RICE: I think you had better call attention, for
the purpose of the record, to the pencilled change
you made, that the claim now for chattels to
30 \$2349.50 instead of \$2439.00.

MR. RUSSELL: That has been amended in all of them.

MR. RICE: There was a pencilled note here, but I didn't know whether it was on the one that you are filing.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes, it is. The summary of evidence has been amended in all cases. In any event, the claim is \$1915.79 as shown on the last page.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: How much?

MR. RUSSELL: \$1915.79. I will put the summary in.
(SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

MR. RUSSELL: Q: You are claiming for a fishing boat, Mr. Takasaki, is that right?

A Yes.

Q This is your own boat? A: Yes.

Q You say you paid \$900.00 for it, is that right?

A Yes.

Q You bought the boat in 1938?

A Yes.

Q And you put in a new motor you say in 1939?

A Yes.

MR. RUSSELL: I am going to ask my learned friend to produce a certificate of British Registry, which he has in his file.

MR. RICE: This is the document you refer to, is it?
It is only a copy.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes. Your Honour, I would just put in a copy of the certificate of British Registry which shows the present value of the boat at \$900.00.

MR. RICE: I don't think that is a correct statement.

I think it was the present value at the time
it was registered.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes. It says "Present value, \$900.00."
(CERTIFICATE MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Now, Mr. Takasaki, you made a
declaration -- is that your declaration, what
is known as the J.P. form, dated in April, 1942,
I believe, is that right? A: Yes.

Q In the J.P. form there is a boat listed. This
document says "1 motor boat"?

A Yes.

Q "1 motor boat 'H.Y.' \$600.00, in custody at New
Westminster, B.C." Now, I want to know why it
was put down as \$600.00 in the declaration which
you made, or apparently made, in April, 1942, in
view of the fact that the registry value is
\$900.00, and I also want to know why you are now
claiming \$900.00 if you put it down in the J.P.
form as \$600.00?

MR. RICE: He is only claiming \$675.00.

A At the time that registration was made I had
an argument with an R.C.M.P. officer previously, and
although I wasn't ready...

MR. RUSSELL: ...I am sorry, I have made a mistake. He
is claiming \$675.00. \$900.00 was the new value of
the boat. I am sorry, the mistake was mine.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes, I noticed that.

MR. RUSSELL: Now, I want to know why he put down \$675.00?

THE INTERPRETER: Well, he said at that time he had an
argument with this R.C.M.P. officer and, therefore,

he felt that he would put any price down on it, and he just put \$600.00 down on the registration form.

A In any case, I wasn't thinking much about such matters at the time, therefore, I revised the figure later on when I heard that some friends of mine had sold some boats at that price.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Well, you aren't going to file the J.P. form?

A: That is why I sold or put the price at that.

MR. RUSSELL: I am always hesitant about filing it for the reason that I don't know what attitude the Commission is taking. I am not putting it in as part of my case. I would just as soon my learned friend did that.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Very well.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Now, in addition to the fishing vessel, on page 3 of your summary of evidence you list a spotlight, a generator, water tank, and some other boat equipment for which you are claiming?

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Now, can't he answer the question without giving an explanation?

A These items had no connection with the fishing boat. I had them in stock and I used to sell them to other fishermen as they required them.

MR. RUSSELL: Could you answer me directly in English?

A I don't speak much.

Q Well, this spotlight, generators and so on, that you are claiming, were they attached to the

fishing vessel that you are claiming \$675.00 for?

A No.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: All right, that answers the question.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Did you own any other boat besides the boat for which you are claiming \$675.00?

Q When did you sell that? A: Two or three days before I evacuated, you see.

10 Q I see. And did any of this equipment come off that boat? A: No, just the water tank.

Q Just the water tank? A: Yes, and the anchor.

Q Have you a brother by the name of Yukinori?

A Yes.

Q I am showing you a letter from your brother which reads as follows,

MR. RUSSELL: I would draw your honour's attention to the fact that that agreement for sale is not signed by the representative of the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee, it is signed by the Custodian.

MR. RICE: He is the only one that could sign it, unless the claimant decided to sign it himself.

MR. RUSSELL: Well, I think you are right there, as a matter of fact, but that may be of some interest later on when the cases are re-heard at the Court.

MR. RICE: Well, I am submitting, your Honour, that the vessel, this fishing vessel was disposed of by the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee and the claim is not within the terms of reference.

I am also submitting that the chattels which were not shipped or not discarded as worthless were sold for their fair market value.

I submit as an exhibit an analysis of personal

MR. RICE: I submit a personal property summary.

(SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 6).

GROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. RICE:

Q I show you your J.P. form, completed on the 8th of April, 1942 (indicating); does that bear your signature, that document? A: Yes.

Q That is your J.P. form? A: Yes.

MR. RICE: I tender his J.P. form as an exhibit.

(J.P. FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 7).

MR. RICE: I show you two releases, one dated July 13th, 1943, and the other dated December 15th, 1943, whereby you released the Custodian from any further claim to the articles mentioned in these releases; do these documents bear your signatures?

A Yes.

Q They are both signed by you? A: Yes.

Q I can perhaps tender both as one exhibit, your Honour.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. RICE: One release dated July 13th released a washing machine, Beatty, stored with John Jacobson at Brunswick Cannery, one typewriter, Remington, paper box, 2 No. 8 and No. 9, books in it, record, Brunswick Cannery, Ladner, B. C. The other release is dated December 15th, 1943, and releases Japanese records, *not received* ~~not~~ twine, three boxes, picture without frame, carpenter tools in box, big black box.

A Can I say something for that thing?

MR. RICE: Yes, if you wish to.

A I not receive that not twine in there; I not receive even one pound.

(RELEASE MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 8).

MR. RICE: Q: Apparently these are the shipping bills that accompanied these releases. You received the washing machine and the typewriter?

A2 Yes.

10 Q The washing machine with a bench attached to it?

A The washing machine and the typewriter I received.

Q And the bench that went with it? The bench for tubs, I presume?

A: Yes, bench.

Q And the other shipping bill refers to two boxes of effects, No. 3 and 13, and two "ctns" effects,-- I don't know whether that is meant for cartons,-- No. 5 and 12. Did you receive two boxes of effects?

A Yes, it contained dolls.

Q It contained dolls? A: Yes.

20 Q But your statement is that you received all those articles that you signed a release for with the exception of the twine? A: Yes, just the twine missing.

MR. RUSSELL: Is my learned friend putting in these shipping bills?

MR. RICE: I will if you wish them.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes.

MR. RICE: Perhaps they can go in as part of the exhibit I have just filed.

30 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Attach them to Exhibit 8.

MR. RICE: The shipping or way bills.

MR. RIGGS Q: You left certain articles with Mr. John Jacobson at Ladner, B. C., did you not?

A Yes.

Q When you were evacuated? A: Yes.

Q You left your Chesterfield suite, did you, with him?

A Yes.

Q And you left a kitchen stove? A: No.

Q He says that you left a kitchen stove, a three-piece bed-room suite, two radio tables?

A That is my brother's. Mine is just chesterfield.

Q That is your brother's? A: Yes.

Q Well, they were left with John Jacobson, is that it?

A Yes.

Q All of your property that was left with him was this chesterfield suite? A: Yes, just the chesterfield.

Q I show you a letter, apparently signed by you; is that your signature? A: Yes.

Q That is a letter that you wrote on September 6th from Iron Springs, Alberta? A: Yes.

Q Addressed to the office of the Custodian at Vancouver.

"I am going to write a letter to your office to send my stuff and what is like those things that I had left the coast (Brunswick Cannery, Ladner, B.C.) when I leave there. That why will you please let me know all the things in house and all the nets and fishing equipment which are storaged in Brunswick

Cannery. These are Y. Takasaki #1, #2, #3,

MR. RICE: Q: I believe you left on your boat the stove,
a battery, an anchor and the set of wrenches?

A Pardon?

Q Did you leave on your boat the stove?

A Yes.

Y. Takasaki,

Q A battery? A: Yes.

Q An anchor? A: Yes.

Q And a set of wrenches? A: Yes.

MR. RICE: I am submitting, your Honour, that that equipment is part of the boat equipment and was sold with the boat.

Q The spotlight, wasn't that on the boat?

A Yes, one.

Q That is all you are claiming for. I mean, there are other batteries you are claiming for, six batteries, storage batteries; did you say that you sold batteries?

A: Well, just one battery in boat.

Q Yes? A: The other six we using at different place.

A Well, that is a new one too.

A Well, that must be upside down.

Q I think so. You are claiming for lumber, or did I understand you to say that you are claiming for lumber, 500 feet of cedar lumber?

A Yes.

Q Hadn't you used any of that lumber?

A No.

Q How long did you buy it before you were evacuated?

A Before war. Before start war.

A That is about three or four months, end of 1941.

MR. RICE: That is another one that is upside down, the price paid is \$7.00 and you are claiming \$13.00?

A No, it is \$25.00 each.

Q No, that is the next item, \$25.00 each. I am talking about the item that is misnamed there, two vessel stoves, purchased in 1938 for \$7.00 and which you claim at the time you were evacuated to be worth \$13.00?

A: That is two.

Q That is true?

A: Two stoves.

Q Well, that is what it says, two stoves that cost you \$7.00.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q: Do you mean \$7.00 each?

A One is \$7.00, and I should put one in \$15.00.





Referring to your letter of December 4th re the above claim, in regard to the fishing vessel, the Commissioner in his Special Report "On 25 Fishing Vessels Sold and Delivered to Purchasers by the J.F.V.D.C. Prior to Aug. 1, 1942", stated that in regard to Case 760, no material was available as to the appraised price and in the absence of this appraisal or other evidence, he would have added 15% to the selling price, namely \$36.25. Your quotation from Mr. McFarland's letter to you states, "I think you will appreciate that Commissioner Bird has definitely ruled that he will not include these sales as being within the terms of reference, but will make a special recommendation therefor."

In reviewing this matter, the Commissioner has been given evidence showing that this vessel was appraised by Lloyd's for \$320.00, that the Committee's negotiating price was \$403.00 and the sale price was \$379.00. The sale of this vessel therefore, falls in the same category as those vessels subject to case numbers 639, 641, 642, 732, 753 and 1293 in regard to which the Commissioner stated that these vessels were sold at prices greater than the appraised price, but less than the negotiating price, and that in regard to these vessels, he would not recommend any special award.

Concerning the matter of chattels, this office has no record of any arrangement made between Mr. Braithwaite and Mr. McFarland, and Mr. Braithwaite cannot find any reference to this settlement in his own files. Even if the arrangement was made, no change was made in the yellow award sheet and it is quite evident it was not submitted to the Commissioner as the Appendix to his Report only calls for an award of \$130.00 based on a claim for missing items amounting to \$220.00.

It is quite impossible for us to make any payment not in line with the amounts shown in the Appendix unless the Commissioner will consider making a special recommendation at this time. We are prepared to submit this matter to him but he has been very busy recently and I am waiting for him to advise us when he will be able to review any cases connected with the Claims Commission.

Apparently the only record of the increase in the award is my letter referred to by Mr. Virtue. I am absolutely satisfied that I made the settlement with Mr. Braidwood on behalf of Mr. Virtue and that the amended award sheet was delivered to Mr. Braidwood's office. As we were at the time delivering large numbers of award sheets and likewise he was delivering award sheets to our office unfortunately we did not take receipts from each other for the same at that time. I realize therefore that the whole matter now depends upon the writer's own integrity. In these circumstances unless adjustment in the award which my letter indicates was made by way of settlement between Mr. Braidwood and myself is given effect to my firm will be required to assume personal responsibility for the difference in the award settled upon and the award shown in your Lordship's report.


