PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

File No. 2013

August 26, 1947.

Re: Iwasaku KAKUNO, Reg. No. 09977

This man signed a declaration to the Custodian on March 28, 1942. He was evacuated on April 28, 1942.

CHATELS

In his declaration he reported the following chattels:

1. Gasoline Engine, Water Pump, left with Mr. Morris, Lakehill P.O.
2. Piano, Piano Accordion, Tools, left with Mrs. McMorran, Cordova Bay P.O.
3. Lamp, left with Mrs. L. Kellow, R.M.D. #4, Victoria
4. Trailer, containing bunks, sink, etc. with Norris Estates, Victoria

Letters dated September 21, 1942, were received from Mr. Morris, Mrs. McMorran and Mrs. Kellow, acknowledging that they had in their possession the articles which KAKUNO declared he had left with them. As no acknowledgment was received from Norris Estates, we wrote to them on November 16, 1942, requesting information regarding the trailer which KAKUNO had stated he had left with them. No reply was received so we wrote to KAKUNO on December 4, 1942, advising him that we had written to Norris Estates asking them to acknowledge holding his trailer but had received no reply. KAKUNO was asked to inform us whether or not he had sold or otherwise disposed of the trailer. No reply was received to this letter and no reply was received to our letter of December 24, 1942. As the file does not reveal the final disposition of the chattels declared by KAKUNO we wrote to him on August 26, 1947, advising him that we had no objections to any arrangements he might make with the holders of his chattels in regard to their disposition.

According to a memo from the B. C. Security Commission to their New Denver Supervisor, dated November 25, 1943, thirteen parcels of effects were shipped to KAKUNO from Gulf Island. In her JP form Mrs. KAKUNO (File 6555) had declared furniture and household effects left at Salt Spring Island, Ganges. The Supervisor at New Denver was instructed to collect from KAKUNO shipping and handling charges amounting to \$14.83. The Supervisor replied on December 4, 1943, that KAKUNO had requested only a small portion of the goods shipped and was willing to pay only a portion of the charges. A letter from the B. C. Security Commission, dated December 24, 1943, states that \$7.50 was paid by KAKUNO, but as he did not order shipment of most of his goods the Commission felt it was appropriate for the Custodian to pay the remainder of the charges without any debit being made against KAKUNO's account. This office replied on December 31, 1943, that this was a case where our Agent had used his discretion in the shipment of what he felt the Japanese would require and we felt it was reasonable to recover the whole amount from the Japanese. The Commission was advised that we held no credit to KAKUNO's account with this office and that we thought it reasonable to make another attempt to collect from the Japanese.

SPECIFIED ARTICLES

Camera

KAKUNO surrendered one Vest Pocket Kodak Camera to the R.C.M.P. in Victoria. On July 4, 1947, we wrote to KAKUNO advising him that his camera was still in storage and if he wished it shipped to send his R.C.M.P. receipt or sign the enclosed declaration. KAKUNO returned his receipt on July 24, 1947, and stated he wished the camera returned to him. However, when the cameras had been brought to the office on July 9, 1947, it

was found that KAKUNO's camera was not on hand. It is presumed the camera was stolen during a break-in at the warehouse. KAKUNO was advised that his camera is missing on August 26, 1947.

MONIES OWING

A letter from the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association Limited, dated November 2, 1942, reveals that S. KAKUNO was one of the creditors of J. C. Leaman, the liquidation of whose business was in the hands of the Association. The letter stated that KAKUNO would be entitled to a small dividend arising from the next distribution of funds. Although the man mentioned was S. KAKUNO it was felt that Iwasaku KAKUNO was probably the party concerned as the address given in the letter was the same as the address of Mrs. Iwasaku KAKUNO. Accordingly, we wrote to KAKUNO on November 13, 1942, enquiring whether or not he was the party concerned and requesting particulars about the claim. No reply was received to this letter and no reply was received to our letter of December 18. No further action was taken by this office in regard to this matter and no funds were received from this source to place to KAKUNO's credit.

We acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 24th in which you enclosed the receipt received from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at the time of the surrender of your camera.

Although we reported to you on July 4th that your camera was in Custodian storage, an inventory of cameras taken later in July showed that this camera was missing. It would appear that the camera must have been stolen from the warehouse. If your camera should be recovered, we shall ship it to you immediately. We regret very much that we are unable to send the camera to you now as you wished.

With reference to the chattels which you declared in 1942 to have been left with friends on Vancouver Island, we wish to inform you that this office has no objection to any arrangements you may make with the holders of your goods in regard to their disposition. In regard to the trailer which you stated was left with Morris Estates, Victoria, we note from your file that Morris Estates have never acknowledged holding your trailer and no reply was received from you to our letters of December 4, 1942, and December 24, 1942, in regard to the whereabouts of the trailer. We therefore presume that you disposed of this trailer yourself in 1942.

In Chief.

IWABAKU KAKUNO, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the interpreter as follows:

MR. McMASTER: In this case, my lord, I would ask leave to amend the claim form. This is a chattel claim and referring to the back of the claim form, items numbered 3 to 7 apparently were left by the claimant out in his fields and were not reported to the Custodian. We are dropping the claim with respect to those. With respect to items 1 and 2, the camera was lost, so the claimant was advised, in August of 1947, and he is reducing the claim on the camera to \$15.00 and leaving the claim on the trailer at \$80.00. That will make his total claim \$95.00. I understand the trailer, the Custodian never found, nor did he do anything about it except to write letters. It wasn't sold in any event. So the net claim is for \$95.00, my lord.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. McMASTER:

- 20 Q Witness, did you instruct Mr. Leckie to prepare this statement with regard to your camera and trailer with respect to which you are now making your claim? A: Yes.
- Q Would you be good enough to sign it, please? Are the statements contained therein true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?
- A Yes.

MR. McMASTER: I file that statement as Exhibit 1, my lord. Perhaps my friend will be good enough to admit that the camera was lost.

I. Lakuno,
In Chief.

MR. HUNTER: Correct, my lord.

MR. McMASTER: Do you want that filed, Mr. Hunter, (indicating), in view of the fact you have only the two items left and didn't do anything with them? I think it just clutters up the record. My lord, referring to Exhibit 1, the camera is an Eastman vest pocket camera, a Kodak, in a leather case, purchased about 1936. He paid \$25.00 for it and is claiming \$15.00. He turned that in to the R.C.M.P. as appears from his statement in Victoria in January, 1942. In July, 1947, the Custodian wrote he had it in storage but he later wrote in August, 1947, that it was missing from storage.

The trailer he left at the Morris Estates on their property, Government Road, Victoria, B. C., and gave this information in his J.P. form. They gave him permission to leave it on their property, but assumed no responsibility for same. He states no arrangements were made with Morris Estates for the sale of his trailer, either at the time of his evacuation or afterwards. The Custodian wrote him in December, 1942, saying the Morris Estates had failed to reply to their letter about the trailer and they asked the claimant if he had sold it, and he didn't reply because he had given full information about it in his J.P. form. Apparently in December, according to a report which I think my friend has, there is some statement that the camera was broken. However, he states it wasn't broken, that it had become slightly loose at one corner and

he had reinforced it to keep it steady. In estimating his values he has allowed for the use and condition of these articles. Your witness, Mr. Hunter,

MR. HUNTER: It is submitted, my lord, that the price asked for the camera is exorbitant.

THE COMMISSIONER: You did not have any appraisal in this instance?

10 MR. HUNTER: I don't see one. We have particulars of it and we can ascertain from dealers what the prices were about those times.

THE COMMISSIONER: What is the situation with regard to the trailer?

MR. HUNTER: The situation with regard to the trailer, my lord, is that it was never found.

THE COMMISSIONER: It was declared though.

MR. HUNTER: Yes, my lord. It is submitted, my lord, that the price claimed for the trailer is very exorbitant. If your Lordship will refer to Exhibit 1, you will
20 see that the trailer was complete except he hadn't equipped it with wheels. So it is quite possible when we wrote the Morris Estates, that they didn't recognize it as a trailer. It was of galvanized iron construction as the witness has stated in his claim form. Since the witness has admitted receiving the letter of the 24th of December, 1942, in which we asked for particulars of the trailer, possibly my friend would admit that a subsequent letter was written again asking for particulars.

30 MR. McMASTER: Yes, I will admit those letters.

MR. HUNTER: I will file those letters, my lord, letters of December 4th and 24th, my lord, from the Custodian to the claimant, 1942, as one exhibit.

MR. HUNTER: I will file the R.C.M.P. report regarding the Kodak, my lord. It is dated August 18th, 1944, and describes it as one vest-pocket Kodak, lens 6.3, lens serial number 16405. Front piece of camera has been repaired, glued on. Serial number 67399.

(REPORT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. HUNTER:

Q Mr. Kakuno, you state in your claim form that you gave the Custodian full particulars of this property. How do you reconcile that with the fact that you never told him there were no wheels on it?

A He said I may have been mistaken in calling this a trailer as it had no wheels. He says I may have made a mistake in describing it.

Q What other way would you describe it?

A I don't know exactly what to call it but a trailer.

MR. HUNTER: I see. That is all, my lord.

RE-DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. McMASTER:

Q Witness, was this thing which you called a trailer fitted up so that wheels could have been put on it?

A: Yes, wheels could have been put on it.

MR. McMASTER: Could my friend admit that the only effort

that the Custodian made to locate this was a letter to the Morris Estates and the letters to the claimant which he has filed?

MR. HUNTER: I think that is so, my lord, from the file.

MR. McMASTER: And he received no reply from Morris Estates Limited?

THE COMMISSIONER: Perhaps in the circumstances you better not seek to bind the Government now. After all they have to put in their defence later.

10 MR. McMASTER: Yes, but if they made other efforts, I would like to know before this witness leaves.

MR. HUNTER: From the present file I think all I can say is that that is all I know of, but I wouldn't like to say definitely.

THE COMMISSIONER: A: Had you put springs on this trailer? A: No.

Q It was just a frame? You had no springs?

A No.

MR. McMASTER: One question, my lord; I am sorry.

20 Q Were you or was someone else living in that trailer before you were evacuated?

A No.

Q Yourself? A: No, an employee.

Q Your employee, was it? A: Yes.

Q Was he paying rental? A: No.

MR. HUNTER: Could you find out who the employer was? Was it Morris Estates?

MR. McMASTER: Q: Who was your employer? Who was
