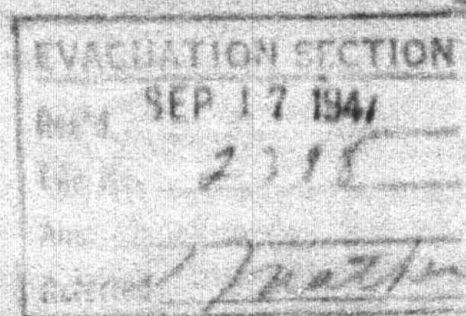

Enclosed is Custodian cheque for the sum of \$401.14, which represents all the funds standing to your credit with this office.

Your file has been reviewed and it has been revealed that the property which you reported to this office has been disposed of as follows:

The ten packages of personal belongings which you stated were at the Canadian Pacific Wharf, Vancouver, on March 26, 1942, were released to you, and acknowledged by you in your letter of July 13, 1942.

The boat engine which you left in the care of Mr. Stanley Littleton, of Ueluelet, was sold in May, 1942, for the sum of \$50.00, which was remitted to you in May, 1943.

Our records show that the sewing machine left by you at Ueluelet was shipped to you in December, 1942.

The vessel "T.S.", Victoria Licence No. 1841, was sold by the Custodian for the net sum of \$388.89, which was credited to your account.

The sum of \$12.25 was received as full settlement of the claim for refund of expenses incurred at the time of the impounding of your vessel. This claim was filed through the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee. The \$12.25 were credited to your account with this office.

It would appear that we have accounted for all the property of every kind left by you in the protected area which vested in the Custodian. In order that you may confirm this and acknowledge the attached cheque, we enclose a stamped, addressed envelope.

This man signed a declaration to the Custodian on March 26, 1942. He was evacuated on June 29, 1942.

In his declaration he reported 10 packages of personal belongings at C.P.R. Wharf, Vancouver. These were released to SHIMIZU and acknowledged in a letter of July 13, 1942.

In his declaration this man reported a boat engine left with Mr. Stanley Littleton at Ucluelet. This engine was sold in May, 1942 and the amount of \$50.00 was credited to this man's account. This sum was remitted to him on May 24, 1943. This sale was made with the approval of Mr. Shimizu.

In his declaration this man reported a sewing machine left at Ucluelet. This sewing machine was sent to SHIMIZU in December, 1942.

In his declaration he reported a motor boat "T. S." in custody at Ucluelet. This boat was sold in September, 1943, and the net proceeds of the sale in the amount of \$388.89 were credited to this man's account.

The account of this man was credited with the sum of \$12.25 received in settlement of claim lodged through the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee as refund of expenses incurred at the time of the impounding of the vessel "T.S.".

This file reveals no other property of any kind.

In reply to your letter of February 14th in which you lodge a claim for \$99.00 covering expenses and wages in connection with the impounding of an unnamed fishing vessel, we wish to advise that the claim which you filed with the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee for refund of expenses in connection with the vessel "T.S.", Victoria licence 1841, has been paid in full and the funds have been credited to your account in this office. The claim which has been settled in full by the Canadian Government was made up as follows:

It is our understanding that these claims were lodged with Mr. Kishiso KIMURA, fishermen's representative on the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee and that the claims were investigated and the correctness of each claim verified by him and representatives of the fishermen from each district. These claims were filed with the Canadian Government by the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee and when settlement was made by the Government funds were paid in to the Custodian's office. The only concern this office has had with these claims is to see that the account of the person concerned is credited with the amount of his claim as shown by the list which the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee turned over to this office. We are therefore not in a position to deal with this claim for \$99.00.

REPORT

re: JAPANESE PROPERTY - Disposal of, Ucluelet and Tofino.

Spring Cove:

Katsushita, Dazo - owner of store stock, to the value of \$6000. The bulk of which packed and shipped to Vancouver. The balance sold in Ucluelet at good prices. The store building rented from G. H. Smith, Victoria, B. C.

Horishita, Ueszo - owner of store stock, to the value of \$2000. This stock turned completely over to the Hootka-Banfield Store, Ucluelet. An inventory taken by Horishita and Hootka-Banfield Store. This stock stored at Hootka-Banfield Store and untouched, pending instructions from the Custodian Japanese Property, through its General Manager, Mr. Rosenberg, Vancouver, Head Office.

At Spring Cove also one house of the value of \$1500. Situated on the property of a Miss E. O. Kennedy (G. H. Smith, Victoria, her Agent). This house owned by the Ucluelet Fishing Co. and the land leased until 1945. Ronald Matterson, agent, is renting this house for 24 dollars a month and will arrange as to payment of lease monies.

2388 One house and furnishings to the value of \$500. situated on the property of W. W. Saggars, Spring, and owned by Toshiro Shimizu, with the arrangement that if he moved from this house the property would belong to Saggars. I understand that during the past 15 odd years Shimizu, who built the house, has paid Saggars \$750. for the land rental. Saggars, when Shimizu was evacuated, gave a cheque for \$250. for house and furnishings complete.

TOSHIO SHIMIZU, having been first duly sworn, testified through the Interpreter as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

Q. Is that your signature? A. Yes.

Q. Was that form prepared upon your instructions?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you swear the contents of it are true?

A. Yes.

(PERSONAL PROPERTY, FISHING VESSELS CLAIM FORM
MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

Q. I understand that prior to the evacuation you lived at Springs Cove at Delaet?

A. Yes.

Q. And you were a fisherman? A. Yes.

Q. And you owned a boat known as T.S. 153?

A. Yes.

MR. CHRISTIAN: I tender as Exhibit 2 the analysis of personal property claim.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM,
MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

Q. And that boat, like all the others, was taken over by the Navy in December, 1941, was it?

A. Yes.

Q. Now, I understand that you built the whole of this boat yourself, did you? A. Yes.

Q. Are you a shipwright? A. Yes.

Q. And the cost then I take it of the hull shown here as \$1,000 in 1933 would represent your own labour and the material that went into it?

A. Yes.

1 Q. And I take it that you then purchased the
2 engine, and did you install it or did you have some
3 one else install the engine in the hull?

4 A. I installed it myself.

5 Q. What type of engine was it? A. A Vivian.

6 Q. A Vivian 15 horsepower marine engine?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Now, this remark about the boat being over-
9 hauled every year; did you do that yourself?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Was this boat small enough to be taken out
12 of the water at the end of the season or did you
13 leave it in the water all winter?

14 A. Every year it is customary to take the boat
15 out of the water and overhaul it and afterwards you
16 put it in the water again.

17 Q. And was the boat painted each year when it
18 was taken out of the water? A. Yes.

19 Q. Now, this gear that you show on your claim

1 Q. These coils of manilla rope which you valued
2 at \$40; can you give us any idea what the length of

Q. Mr. Christie asked you why you didn't mention
these items in your J.P. form which you signed at the
end of June, 1942. Now, as I understand your evidence
you say this gear was on the boat and the boat was
taken from you in December, 1941, wasn't it?

A. Yes.

Q. So actually you didn't have any of this gear
when you signed this form?

A. That is so.

Q. I wish to tender as Exhibit 5 an appraisal
of G. W. Phillips. The appraisal was made in March
or April, 1942, it doesn't give a definite date. The
appraised value is \$200.

Q. I would like to file as Exhibit 6 a summary

MR. CHRISTIE: Your honour, I didn't put it in for that purpose; the only reason I put it in was to show the valuation put on these parts in the settlement.

MR. BERT: I take it that the generator would be the dynamo. I understand your boat, like most of the others, lay at New Westminster during the winter of 1941-42, or do you know?

A. Yes, it was at New Westminster.

Q. Now this appraisal that was made in 1942 in April says the deck needs extensive repairs. It doesn't say what part of the deck, what do you say about the condition of the deck when the boat was taken over?

A. There was no need for any repairs to the deck when I handed the boat over, it was in good condition.

MR. CHRISTIE: It is submitted, your honour, this boat was sold at its fair market value.
