



Re: Mr. and Mrs. Mansuke TANINO

I have been through these two files as a preliminary to closing them and think that it is very clear that the Japanese have no longer any equity in their building if indeed it has not already been torn down. On December 29th, 1942, Mr. Ormond claimed that ground rent was due to him in the amount of \$30.00 and he would only be able to rent the house if a brick chimney was installed. This was not found practicable without an unjustifiable expense and as far as I can trace, the building was never rented. Do you recall if it was still standing when you last visited Manaimo?

The house pointed out to us as Tanino's was built on piling (now in precarious condition) below high tide level, and there would appear to be no interest that vests in the Custodian (or the Evacuee).

Further to my memorandum to Mr. Bell of April 6th, it might be mentioned that as in the case of some other Nanaimo files, chattels are not very well accounted for here though it seems that at least one shipment was made on the wife's file. The remaining items, which, with the possible exception of the sewing machine (probably since received) would not have been of much value and were moved to storage at the Japanese School and subsequently to sale by auction as per auction lists on the husband's file. For all practical purposes, therefore, chattels may be regarded as closed on these files but when proceeds are sent to the owner an enquiry will be made about the neighbour with whom his belongings were left.

Dear Sir and Madam:-

This letter is to advise you of the current position of your assets left behind in the protected area.

The house you occupied was, you will remember, erected on leased property and as the owner of the land did not recognize that you had any equity in it and indeed made a claim for ground rent, we have allowed it to revert to him.

Some of your belongings have been sent to you and your wife and the balance sold as per enclosed auction sheets. The proceeds have been credited to your account and can be made available to you with the approval of the B. C. Security Commission.

Your original declaration seemed to indicate that you may have left some other belongings in the care of friends at Nanaimo and if this is so, you should write and tell us who they are and where we may contact them.
