Dear Mr. Dusenbury:

I have written your office before requesting my portion of the share capital but have not as yet received anything. I was told at the time that it cannot be forwarded until the account of Nippon Auto Supply Co., Ltd. is closed. At that time our assets were liquidated and I was hoping that a cheque will be coming in the near future. A long time has elapsed since your last letter and I am without either a remittance or words as to what happened.

I am appealing to you personally, Mr. Dusenbury, in the hopes that you can somehow speed things up for me. As you can easily imagine, an average person who left the coast has had a tough enough time. As I said in my last letter I have been very seriously ill and had a complete physical and nervous break-down soon after leaving Vancouver. The expenses incurred has cleaned me out of whatever I had and have put me in debt with two of my friends. With no steady income since leaving Vancouver you can see, Mr. Dusenbury, in what kind of a financial position I will be in. I can assure you that I am not exaggerating anything as you can soon find out by writing to the following doctors at their respective addresses.: Dr. Miyasaki, Lillooet Postoffice, B. C.; Dr. Willoughby, c/o Burriss Clinic, Kamloops, B. C.; Dr. McClelland, Medical Arts Bldg., Toronto, Ont.; Dr. Richardson (nerve specialist), Medical Arts Bldg., Toronto, Ont.; and to the following dentists, Dr. Fujiwara, Lillooet, B. C. and Dr. Dobbie, Danforth at Greenwood Ave., Toronto, Ont.

After having Dr. ~~Richardson~~ **Miyasaki** examine and give me medicines, I was advised by him to go to Kamloops to Dr. Willoughby. The latter operated on me but the results were not altogether successful and in a couple of months my conditions got worse than ever and I was sent back to the hospital in Kamloops. I was under Dr. Willoughby's care for six weeks after which time he advised another operation which was more serious than the first. After careful consideration I decided to transfer to Toronto where there will be complete facilities. There Dr. McClelland, who was personally recommended by Dr. Willoughby, and who proved to be one of the best abdominal surgeons out here, operated on me. After the second operation my pains which bothered me before disappeared. However it took me a couple of months in the hospital and another two and a half

months before I can do light duties.

When in B. C. just travelling to the hospital in Kamloops costed me considerably. I believe it was close to four hundred miles from the place I was working to the hospital and the greater portion (90%) was in a taxi going ~~to~~ get there the first time. Then between the two trips there I had to stay in town for ten days to regain my strength to make the journey home. All this piled on me after a long winter lay-off.

After recuperating in Toronto I took a what I considered to be a comparatively easy job of chauffeuring for a millionaire. However, the work turned out to be quite hard as I had to look after four cars, driving one pretty steady and others in between, do work like mowing a good sized lawns, laying sods and carrying in dirts and fertilizers, besides waxing floors and doing other works in the kitchen, etc. I soon started to get cramps quite regularly around the region operated on and had to see the doctor. I had nervous trouble after that for which I also had to see a doctor before getting well. I finally quit the job after sticking it out for over a year. After that I got two or three jobs but my old troubles (cramps and nerves) turned up every once in a while. Even now I cannot say that I am completely cured of this as I had pretty bad nerves about a months ago and cramps bother me once in a while, although the latter is not quite as bad as it used to be. I've worked at my present job for nearly seven months and hope to hang on if my trouble does not recur too often. I've had to stay away from work three times already, once for eight days.

I am working in a body and paint shop at present. Although it is hard on your health I figured the wages would be better than working in an ordinary factory and I would be able to straighten out my poor financial condition sooner. With things as high as they are I have only a few dollars to spare after paying for my board and other necessities. I figure if I was to square myself with the people who helped me when I was in need I've got to secure funds from the share of the proceeds from liquidation of Nippon Auto Supply Co., Ltd. of which I was one of the partners.

The reason I wrote this lengthy letter going into details is so that I can present my case before you, Mr. Dusenbury, in the hope that you will see that it is better to send me the due amount now rather than at some future date. Let me emphasize the fact again that none of the above details are exaggerated one little bit. Kindly consider the conditions and accomodate me by settling my account at your earliest convenience.
