PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

July 9, 1946.

Re: Joe MIYASHITA, Registration No. 10975

This man signed a declaration to the Custodian on April 4, 1942 in which he reported that he owned no property of any kind in the protected area. He was interned on October 19, 1942. He was released on April 19, 1942.

Although he declared no personal property in November, 1942 we were notified that 2 pieces of effects belonging to this man were in the baggage room of the C.P.R. and on November 29, 1942 these were removed to 604 Cordova St. This man requested shipment of these 2 pieces and in May, 1943 remitted \$7.75 to cover shipping costs. These 2 pieces were shipped to him on June 15, 1943, the shipping costs being 5.52. The balance in the amount of \$2.23 is being remitted to him today.

On November 16, 1942 the account of this man was credited with the sum of \$11.00 received from the Department of Mines and Resources as wages for October, 1942. This was remitted to MIYASHITA on February 11, 1943.

This file reveals no other property of any kind.

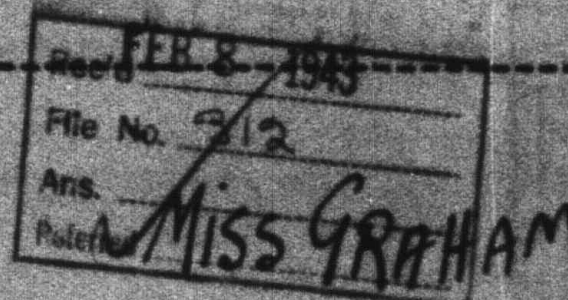

I, the above, had been working at
 Taft, B.C. prior to my internment at this
 camp.

About two months ago I received word
 from my friend in Taft that he had forwarded
 my one suitcase (small) and one cloth bag
 to me and I presumed he had sent those bag-
 gages to this camp, but so far I have not
 received them nor have heard any word about
 its whereabouts.

For this reason I would greatly
 appreciate your immediate investigation
 regarding the above matter and if you
 would kindly notify me as to where they
 are as soon as possible.

Moreover as my bank balance at this
 camp is absolutely nil I would also be
 obliged if you will kindly send me my
 back wages, for the time which I had been
 working at Taft, which amounts to approxi-
 mately fifteen (\$15.00) dollars.
