There is no evidence to support the statement that the winch was left on the boat. On the contrary, all evidence is that this winch was not left on the boat. Prior to filing of claim, Tetauso Matsumura informed the Gustodian that this winch had been left "in one place at Deep Bay" with his other goods. See his letter of March 26, 1946. 

He stated that he had bought a coal burning stove (kitchen) to be sent to Greenwood, but that it was sent to Bastings Park by mistake and that he has heard nothing further about it. We do not know whether this is an additional kitchen store to the one listed above. In his declaration, all his chattels were reported to be at Deep Bay. Until we received the letter of March 26, 1946, we knew nothing of this kitchen stove at Hastings Park. However, among articles stored at 268 Powell St., where Isami SHICHMATSU, File 10438, operated a transfer business was a stove belonging to Mrs. I. MATSUMURA. This might be the stove referred to. It was to be shipped to Greenwood, but our records do not show that it was shipped. We can find no record of the sale of this on any file. (Files No. 6689, 10438 give some information of goods found at 266 and 268 Powell St, which was one building).

The account of this man was credited with \$14.45, in full settlement of claim lodged with Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee for refund of expenses inopered at impounding of his vessel.





We were the first group to evacuate from Deep Bay, Vancouver Island, and at the time the manager there, said that he would look after our goods. When we were evacuated and settled down he promised to send our goods, that is why when we left in a rush we only took our hand baggages; after staying in Vancouver for a short time we had to leave for Greenwood, but In the meantime I tried to get my goods sent from Deep Bay but I souldn't get them in time for my depature for Greenwood. The other people from Deep Bay who didn't leave with us all have received their goods, we are unfortunately the only ones who

I wouldn't mind waiting, but as the wife and myself are n't young anymore, and with winter coming on, and cold weather al already here, we have very little winter clothes with us. When we left Vancouver in May we only had summer appeared, what clothing we have is for summer wear. As for our household goods we didn't bring any, so the people who came with us have been very kind and helped us out in what we need.

I have taking this matter us until resently with the Commission Office here, ever since we've been here but somehow or other there was no results, that is why I have written my recent letter to you. Had I known sooner that there was a Gustodian Office, I would have written you direct a long time ago, and believe that I would have had she goods by this time.

I am asking you from sheer necissity for my goods, that is why I am making this appeal to you to ask that you give your upmost consideration. I would not write to bother you when I know you must be busy taking care of so many goods the people have left behind in your protection, but this is really a
