Custodian's inspector reported May 4th 1942 - Farm, 10 acres, of which there was in crop 5 acres strawberries, $1\frac{1}{4}$ acres in raspberries, $\frac{1}{3}$ acre in loganberries, $\frac{1}{3}$ acre in blackberries, $\frac{1}{3}$ acre in grapes, $\frac{1}{4}$ acre in asparagus and an undetermined area in boysenberries and currants. Buildings on the farm were a 9 room house in "perfect" condition, barn, woodshed, garage, 2 shacks, 2 roothouses. Property occupied by tenant.

HISTORY OF ADMINISTRATION: Leased by the owner on 6th April 1942 for 10 months from 1st April to John Ebner at a rental of \$900.00 (exclusive of portion in hops) for the term, the lease including the growing crop, the use of the buildings and farm implements. Rental paid to the Lessor. Lease excepted hops grown and sold for \$88.88 to The Western Canada Hop Co-operative Union.

This lease was extended with collateral Agreement to September 30th, 1943, at a rental of \$150.00, assigned to The Director, The Veterans' Land Act.

SOLD: To The Director, The Veterans' Land Act for \$1532.00 as at 1st January 1943.
Approval of Advisory Committee 1st June 1943.

FUNDS: Released to the credit of Ruichi HASHIMOTO - Sale Price of \$1532.00 plus \$6.56 refund on insurance, total \$1538.56; less debits of Certificate of Encumbrance \$1.00, registration fee \$3.00, and legal fee \$15.00, total of \$19.00. Net amount released \$1519.56.

PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

CHATELS: The above Japanese declared a quantity of chattels some of which were left on his property at Mission and part being left with Mrs. Mulligan, a neighbor. These were fully detailed in his letter of November 10th, 1944. However, according to the inventory taken by our representative and the goods shipped by Mrs. Mulligan, it would appear that the chattels declared and listed in the letter include the effects of HASHIMOTO's married daughter, Emiko OKIMURA (File #5542) who also declared chattels left at both places. Shipments were made by the Custodian and Mrs. Mulligan in accordance with requests from Mrs. OKIMURA dated January 17th, 1944 and February 15th, 1944 and according to the B.C. Security Commission letter of February 21st, 1944 the first shipment included many numerous personal effects which had been identified as being hers by Mrs. Mulligan. The shipment of a sewing machine was also made to HASHIMOTO upon his request of January 24th, 1944.

All saleable chattels were liquidated, under which \$20.76 net was derived from sale by appraisal and \$342.10 net from sale by auction and the credits placed to HASHIMOTO's account.

When removing the chattels from the property 17 cartons and 6 tins of personal effects were moved to our storage at Haney. These were inspected at a later date, the old clothes and magazines burnt, and saleable articles sold December 14th, 1944 - the proceeds are included above. A shrine and four boxes of effects of a personal nature remain at our Haney storage.

The chattels listed by the above Japanese and by Mrs. OKIMURA appear to be very well accounted for but any distribution of funds between the two will have to be made between themselves. They will be so notified in our reporting letter.

A box of carpenters' tools were given to Mr. Mulligan by HASHIMOTO, according to Mr. Mulligan, for their trouble.

LIVESTOCK: Although he did not declare so to the Custodian, according to the lessee of the property, HASHIMOTO was the owner of a horse which was sold for \$25.00 and approved of in a letter of December 28, 1942. Proceeds were credited to the account March 15/43

SPECIFIED ARTICLES: The above Japanese declared a Ford truck surrendered at Hastings Park. It had however been previously transferred to the Pacific Co-operative Union for sale and was therefore released to that concern. They sold it for \$700.00 and this sum was forwarded to the Custodian to be credited to the Japanese account. (See attached brown-edged Summary.) HASHIMOTO was fully notified May 10th, 1943.

Personal Property Summary (cont.)

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE: According to a note made on the J.P. form of the above Japanese dated September 5th, 1942 by our Mr. Davidson, \$200.00 is owing to HASHIMOTO and K. MATSUI for sale of rhubarb according to a lease found on File #2247, M. KARIATSUMARI. The above Japanese makes no reference to this matter whatsoever nor does K. MATSUI. It is therefore being assumed that the sum was paid at the time the lease referred to was drawn up, which was prior to his evacuation.

The B. C. Electric Rly. Co. paid \$3.00 into this office to HASHIMOTO's credit being refund of his electric light Security Deposit.

BONDS & INVESTMENTS: The above Japanese declared six \$50.00 1941 Victory Bonds. These were not brought under control by the Custodian.

He also declared fifteen \$10.00 shares in the Western Canada Hop Co-operative Union. This is an all Japanese co-operative but no action has been taken as yet by the Custodian towards liquidating it.

He also declared to be the holder of four \$1.00 Pacific Fraser Co-operative Union shares. This however was not brought under control by the Custodian. He also declared to be the holder of Pacific Co-operative Union shares and his interest in this is as follows: \$530.00 in Unredeemable Shares and \$190.00 in Redeemable Shares. The latter are as follows: \$50.00 - 1940 shares; \$140.00 - 1941 shares. The 1940 shares should be redeemed early in 1946 and the 1941 shares early in 1947. Interest totalling \$8.16 on the Pacific Co-operative shares has been received and credited to HASHIMOTO's account.

BANK ACCOUNT: The above Japanese declared a Bank Account at Mission, B. C. This was not brought under control by the Custodian.

LIFE INSURANCE: The above Japanese declared a Canadian Mutual Benefit Association policy for \$2500.00. This was not brought under control by nor administered by the Custodian.

This file reveals no other Personal Property interest.

The above Japanese declared a debt of \$70.00 owing to the Union Fish Company when registering on April 8th, 1942. According to a letter dated May 27th, 1943 from the liquidators of the company, the account was paid in full prior to evacuation.

The Royal Columbian Hospital filed a claim for \$1.00. However, on June 18th, 1943 they notified this office that it had been paid. This account was paid by E.R. Thomson, Solicitor, who was acting on behalf of the above Japanese in a law-suit in which a \$400.00 settlement was made out of which were paid:

Royal Columbian Hospital	\$ 1.00

The balance of \$299.00 was sent direct to the Japanese.

You have previously been advised that a sale of lands in rural districts was entered into between this Department and The Director, The Veterans' Land Act.

Due to the size of this transaction, the arrangements for same and the completion of the transfer have taken a considerable time. Negotiations were started in the early part of 1943 and were based upon valuations made by qualified appraisers and on the basis of a sale effective as at January 1st of that year. This means that the 1943 revenues from the property were for the benefit of the purchasers, but that taxes, fire insurance and other operating charges were assumed by them.



The position of chattels on these files appears to be somewhat as outlined in attached memorandum to file of which I have made an extra copy and perhaps this and the extra copy of the letter will be useful to your fieldmen when they check this property.

Dear Sir:

We wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 5th November, in which you request that your credit balance at this office be forwarded to you.

Your file has now been reviewed and we take this opportunity of giving you a brief summary of our administration of your affairs.

Real property registered in your name at Mission became vested in the Custodian when you registered with this office on the 8th April, 1942. Arrangements had been made by you whereby Mr. J. Ebner leased your property, excluding the hop acreage, for ten months from 6th April, 1942. The rental for the property was \$900.00 and was apparently collected by you at the time. The crop on the hop acreage was sold to the John I. Haas Hop Company under arrangements made by the Western Canada Hop Co-operative Association of which you were a member, and the sum of \$88.88 has been credited to your account from this arrangement as you were so notified by this office in 1943. No further revenue accrued to your credit at this office from the property as it was sold as of the 1st January, 1943, to the Director of Veterans' Land Act in accordance with the Canadian Government's policy of liquidation. Full details of the sale were sent to you on the 13th April, 1944, although since that time legal fees amounting to \$15.00 have been charged to your account in connection with the conveyance of the property.

When registering with this office, you declared that you owed \$70.00 to the Union Fish Company. However shortly after your evacuation, the liquidators of that Company advised us that the account had been paid by you. The Royal Columbian Hospital also filed a claim against you for \$1.00. A Mr. E.R. Thomson, solicitor, who acted on your behalf in a law suit in which a \$400.00 settlement was made, paid this account together with the accounts of Dr. McIntyre and Dr. Chipperfield, and after deducting his legal fees, the balance of \$299.00 was sent to you direct.

You declared to the Custodian that a number of your chattels were left on your property, and in your letter of the 10th November, 1942, forwarded to this office an itemised list of these, together with a list of those left with your neighbour, Mrs. Mulligan. These chattels were inventoried by our representative and found to be correct, but he made note of the fact that your list apparently included a number of chattels owned by your married daughter, Emiko OKIMURA. He also made note to the effect that separate identification of these was impossible.

With the co-operation of the B.C. Security Commission and Mrs. Mulligan,

two shipments of chattels were made to your daughter, and also shipment of your sewing machine to you on the 24th January, 1944. All the remaining saleable chattels have now been liquidated, and the sum of \$20.76 derived from the sale of chattels to the tenant, and \$342.10 derived from the sale of chattels by auction, were credited to your account. Four boxes and a shrine are stored at our Haney storage centre, as they were classified as being of a personal nature. If you desire them shipped to you, please advise us and arrangements will be made to deal with the matter, shipping costs to be cared for by yourself.

It would appear that the funds credited to you from the sale of the chattels might include a portion of your daughter Emiko's. We are attaching hereto itemized sheets covering the sale of the chattels and any portion of the funds that belong to your daughter are being left by this office for you to make distribution between yourselves. Your daughter has also been notified to this effect.

The chattels left in the Protected Area are very well accounted for. However, we make note of the fact that a box of carpenters tools were given to Mr. Mulligan according to him, for their trouble.

Your horse left on the property was sold for the sum of \$25.00, as approved in your letter of the 28th December, 1942. These funds were credited to your account when collected.

You declared a Ford truck to be surrendered at Hastings Park. Prior to its surrender, however, you had transferred it to the Pacific Co-operative Association for sale, and it was therefore released to their custody. It was sold for \$700.00 and this sum was collected by the Custodian and credited to your account, as you were fully advised on the 10th May, 1943.

The B.C. Electric Railway Company paid \$3.00 in to this office to your credit, being the refund of your electric light security deposit.

You declared you were the owner of six \$50.00 Victory bonds, that you had a bank account at Mission, and also were the holder of a Canadian Mutual Benefit Association Insurance policy. These however, were not brought under control by the Custodian.

According to the records of the Pacific Co-operative Union you were the holder of a \$530.00 unredeemable share interest, and a \$190.00 redeemable share interest in that Co-operative. Your redeemable share interest was made up of \$50.00 worth of 1940 shares and \$140.00 worth of 1941 shares. The 1940 shares should be redeemed within the next month, while the 1941 shares should be redeemed early in 1947. We request that you send your share certificates to this office so that their redemption can be dealt with, with as little delay as possible when due.

Your credit balance at this time includes \$8.16 interest on your Pacific Co-operative Union shares. Any interest that accrues in the future, together with any shares that may be redeemed will be forwarded to you at the time, provided your share certificates are sent to this office.

You also declared you were the holder of 15 Western Canada Hop Co-operative shares and four \$1.00 Pacific Fraser Co-operative Union shares. No action has been taken by the Custodian in connection with these Co-operative shares.

Attached hereto is a statement of your account since the date on which you last received one, together with an itemised statement of your chattel sales. The attached Custodian cheque represents the credit balance of \$2007.96 as shown.

It would appear that we have accounted for all the property of every kind left by you in the protected area which vested in the Custodian, and in order that you may confirm this and acknowledge the cheque we are enclosing a stamped addressed envelope for your convenience in replying.
