

Dear Sir:

We are in receipt of your letter of the 6th instant and regret that we are unable to be of assistance to you in tracing the whereabouts of the articles mentioned by you.

We eventually removed all Japanese chattels from this building but the property had been entered by thieves in 1943 and this was something we could not guard against.

We have taken all reasonable measures for protection of personal goods, involving considerable expense in the employment of caretakers, watchmen and night patrol, but in spite of this a certain amount of breaking-in and vandalism has occurred in our storage from time to time resulting in some items being stolen. It would appear that your goods might have been taken under such circumstances.

Burglary and theft are, of course, circumstances which sometimes happen to the most careful property owners even when the owner is in residence and after taking every precaution against such possibilities.

The police have been made aware of this situation and if the missing articles should be recovered you will of course be advised.

Your request and a copy of this letter will remain on our files indicating the facts regarding this matter and be available for review at any future time.

We are closing our files in this connection. The files indicate an unusual amount of correspondence relating to this claim. Our last letter was written to the Department of Labour, Japanese Division on the 15th March last. In this letter we included the father, mother and son, hoping that we might be successful. We received a reply from that Department dated June 7th last from which we quote as follows:-

"The father of this man is in receipt of an Old Age Pension in the amount of \$25.00 a month. Eiichi receives \$45.00 a month in wages, and is not in good health. He states that they are incapable of meeting the claims since he is unwell and physically unfit for heavy work, and that his mother is an invalid, causing additional expenses. He also refuses to make any promises regarding future settlement."

The three are still at Tashme B.C. and their respective names are:- Eiichi NAKANISHI #00046(son) Taki NAKANISHI #00051(mother) Yaichi NAKANISHI #00054(father).
