PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

This man signed a declaration to the Custodian on April 11, 1942. He was evacuated on June 29, 1942.

CHATELS

Prior to his evacuation, TAMAKI operated a confectionery known as the "Lions Gate Confectionery" at 501 Burrard Street. In his declaration, TAMAKI reported only a kitchen stove, two tables and three chairs, left in the suite of room at 501 Burrard. He stated that his wife, File 4060, would give all the information when she was called upon to evacuate.

An undated inventory on file lists the goods declared by Mrs. TAMAKI to be in the store prior to her evacuation. A short report from Walter A. Jacklin, Chartered Accountant, appears on file under date of May 13, 1942.

On June 29, 1942, we wrote to the Canada Permanent Trust Co., agents for the owner of the property at 501 Burrard, advising them that Mrs. TAMAKI had called at the office and notified us that she and her husband were leaving Vancouver that night. She asked that a large number of the items listed on her inventory be stored, and that the store shelves, display show case window, and awnings be sold. The Trust Company was advised that we were willing to store the goods requested, but it was suggested that if agreeable to them, we would leave the goods on the premises in case it was possible for them to find someone who might be interested in the purchase of the fixtures Mrs. TAMAKI had asked to be sold, and those goods which she had asked to be stored. A reply from the Company was received on July 21, 1942, advising that they had been unable to find a purchaser for the fixtures, and asking that they be removed as soon as possible.

An inventory of the goods removed from 501 Burrard St. to 992 Powell St. appears on file under date of July 28, 1942. Dave Smith's note of July 28, 1942, states that all shelving and the display show case window were considered built-ins and could not be removed. Mr. Jacklin's letter of July 28, 1942, states that the TAMAKI's had got rid of their stock before leaving.

On August 13, 1942, we wrote to Mrs. TAMAKI advising her that an enquiry had been received as to whether or not the store fixtures were for sale, and asking if she was interested in the disposal of the things. She replied on August 21, 1942, she was not interested in selling the fixtures.

On August 31, 1942, a list of the goods on hand at 992 Powell St. was sent to Mrs. TAMAKI and she was asked to confirm that this was the only property she had in the protected area. This list was signed and returned by her on September 12, 1942.

On September 15, 1943, goods moved to 992 Powell St. were sold at Vancouver Auction #1 for the net sum of \$99.36. This amount was credited to TAMAKI's account and remitted to him on November 3, 1947. *These goods removed from 501 Burrard.*

On July 23, 1943, a release form was received from TAMAKI, requesting shipment of eight pieces of effects left at the B. C. Purchasers' Cooperative Association Warehouse, 573 East Hastings. However, when the warehouse was visited for the purpose of arranging for shipment which had been asked for by various Japanese, it was found that the building had been ransacked and the goods in a state of utter confusion. (See Mr. Spain's memo of August 12, 1943.) An excerpt from the list of goods received from the warehouse shows the articles removed under TAMAKI's name, and is filed immediately following chattel schedule. These goods were sold at Vancouver Auctions Nos. 14 and 15 for the net sum of \$35.48.

This amount was remitted to him on October 31, 1947.

A letter from the B. C. Security Commission, dated March 18, 1944, reveals that a couch and spring were shipped to Mr. TAMAKI. Charges amounting to \$3.22 were paid from his account.

On December 18, 1942, a letter was received from the Sno Freze Ice Cream Co. advising that they were holding one three-hole ice cream cabinet under Conditional Sales Agreement between the Company and Mrs. TAMAKI. This cabinet would be released upon payment of a \$100.00 balance owing. Several letters were written to TAMAKI in regard to this matter but no reply was received. On September 12, 1944, we wrote to the B. C. Security Commission asking for their cooperation and a copy of a letter received by the Commission from their Supervisor, stating that TAMAKI did not want to pay the \$100.00 owing unless he was assured that he would profit from the sale of the cabinet which the Custodian would effect on the completion of his payments. We replied on October 31, 1944, that the manager of the Ice Cream Company mentioned that he was prepared to buy the cabinet back for \$135.00. After liquidating the unpaid \$100.00 liability, there would be a balance of \$35.00 to be credited to TAMAKI's account. This information was given to TAMAKI, who wrote on November 14, 1944, stating that he had asked the Company whether or not they would store the cabinet for him for the duration upon payment of a storage fee, and if this was possible he would like us to pay the balance of \$100.00. He also stated that if storage was not not he would advise us as to the disposition of the cabinet. No further word was received from TAMAKI but on August 28, 1946, we received a letter from the Sno Freze Ice Cream Co. which had been received by them from TAMAKI. This letter requested the \$35.00 balance which would be derived from the sale of the cabinet to the Company. A cheque for that amount was enclosed and credited to TAMAKI's account.

Some correspondence appeared on file regarding a radio which had been left at Crone Storage but this was transferred to Mrs. TAMAKI's file and handled on that file.

SHARES

The file reveals that TAMAKI held ten shares in the B. C. Purchasers' Cooperative Association. No funds were received to credit to his account from that source.

LIFE INSURANCE

TAMAKI reported a \$1,000.00 policy with the Sun Life Assurance Company. This was not brought under the control of the Custodian.

All funds standing to the credit of TAMAKI with this office were remitted to him on November 3, 1947.

This file reveals no other property of any kind.

This cabinet was later bought back by the Ice Cream Co. and the \$100.00 owing was liquidated - being deducted from the purchase price paid by the Company. (See Personal Property Summary.)



On March 13, 1944, you sent this office a copy of letter sent to your Supervisor at Sannoh, B.C. This letter stated that a shipment had been made to Mr. TAMAKI at the cost of \$3.22. You advised your Supervisor that it was impossible to ship, collect and asked him to send cheque for the amount of the shipping charges promptly.

On the copy of the letter which was sent to the Custodian was written, "Please send cheque". The Custodian therefore, on March 29th, 1944, sent to your office cheque for \$3.22 to cover the charges on this shipment. The account of TAMAKI with this office was debited with this amount.

Mr. TAMAKI now informs us that he paid these shipping charges on March 23, 1944, direct to your Department and he has sent us a receipt which is signed by S. H. Adams, on behalf of the B. C. Security Commission, showing that \$3.22 was received from Ichitaro TAMAKI. Would you kindly forward to this office cheque covering the refund due Mr. TAMAKI. This cheque could be made payable to Mr. TAMAKI, and this office would forward it to him.

Dear Sir:

Mr. Cowdrill of the B. C. Security Commission at Greenwood has handed me correspondence addressed to the B. C. Security Commission at Vancouver relative to an ice cream freeze cabinet purchased by me from the Sno Freeze Ice Cream Co. before evacuation and on which there is still a balance of \$100.00 owing to the Company.

At the time of evacuation I requested the Company to keep the ice cream cabinet in store for me for the duration, which they consented to do upon a monthly storage fee. Subsequently, an order was published that all goods kept in store of Japanese effects must be surrendered to the Custodian, and which the Company complied.

I have written the Sno Freeze Ice Cream Co. as to whether they can again store it for us for the duration upon payment of a storage fee, and if this is possible I would like you to pay up the balance of \$100.00 owing to them so that the title will be clear and I will have possession with the cessation of hostilities. If, on the other hand, storage is not possible I shall advise you as to how the cabinet should be disposed.

At any length I shall write you again as soon as an answer is received from the Sno Freeze Company.

We interviewed Mr. Lewarne Manager of the Sno Freeze Ice Cream Co. regarding the liquidation of this account. We also examined the cabinet which in our opinion might sell for \$150.00 in the season.

Mr. Lewarne appeared anxious to see that a fair settlement is made and went on that he was prepared to buy the cabinet back for \$135.00. After liquidating the unpaid \$100.00 liability, this would leave \$35.00 to be credited to the Japanese account.

This in our opinion is a very satisfactory settlement - because if the cabinet is sold at auction it would mean transfer and auction expenses, and Mr. Lewarne would be entitled to repossession of this article.

We have suggested to him that he write and negotiate direct with Mr. Tanaki and to advise us the results.

This woman signed a "No Property" Card on April 15, 1942, stating that she had no property of any kind in the protected area. She was evacuated on June 29, 1942.

On December 17, 1945, a letter was received from the Department of Labour stating that Mrs. TAMAKI's father had requested that some Japanese books left at R. R. #4, Sullivan District, New Westminster, be shipped to his daughter. On December 19, 1945, we advised the Department that on investigation, the books had been left in a shed and were mildewed and torn. In accordance with our policy, damaged and worn material, if unsaleable, are abandoned, and these books had been destroyed.

On February 16, 1945, Mrs. TAMAKI wrote asking for the release of a box of clothes which she stated was in Crone Storage. Permission for this release was given Crone's on February 19, 1945.

On August 2, 1946, a Custodian Release Form was received requesting shipment of a radio in Crone Storage. Permission was given Crone's for this release on August 9, 1946, but on August 30, 1946, Mrs. TAMAKI wrote asking for the release of her radio. She was notified on September 4, 1946, that permission had been given to Crone's and it was our belief that the shipment had already gone forward. She was advised to send a Custodian Release Form (the first form received was previously filed on her husband's file, #3297) and to take the matter up with the Supervisor of the Department of Labour at Greenwood. No further correspondence in regard to this radio appears on file.

Thank you for your letter of February 9th and enclosures. We note that there are a few items still to be shipped and we will make the necessary arrangements with the B.C. Security Commission.

The balance of goods stored at 573 East Hastings will be moved in the near future and Mr. Spain will arrange with you for a representative from your office to be present and check out all the items. We wish to make it quite clear that with the exception of purely personal articles or those of a sentimental or religious nature (which we shall store for the time being) anything taken into our warehouse is liable to be sold at auction. This is because of the tremendous volume of effects which has already taxed our storage places to the utmost and in accordance with our general policy of liquidation. Please confirm that this point is clear to you.

There is one other matter to raise and that is we understand that it will be impossible to identify a considerable part of the goods. We propose to credit the proceeds of such goods when sold to a lump account under the heading of B.C. Purchasers Co-operative Association, but each item will be described in such a way that the owner should be able to identify the description and claim the proceeds in due course.

The Security Commission accumulated quite a number of Custodian Releases and when sufficient had been received to justify the opening of the premises at 573 East Hastings Street, I phoned Mr. MacLennan, of Morris and MacLennan, and suggested that as legal representatives of the association, and as the key was in their possession, he should accompany us and members of the Security Commission to the Co-operative Warehouse.

At the appointed time about 9 A.M. on August 12th, we met there, and Mr. MacLennan attempted to open the front door. This proved impossible, as there appeared to be some obstruction apart from the condition of the lock itself. Eventually we forced an entrance at the back, and the reason we could not gain entrance by the front door was obvious. Thieves had entered by the front door, and had then placed a plank against the door as a precaution to prevent interruption. The thieves would appear to have had several days ransacking everything. Nothing seemed to have escaped their attention, and the chattels were piled up in a state of utter confusion, making shipment impossible. Both Mr. MacLennan and the Security Commission representative realized the futility of attempting to separate and identify anything.

Mr. MacLennan called in detectives, who made a cursory examination, Mr. MacLennan then decided, and we agreed with him, that shipment would be quite out of the question, unless the Japanese owners came down to Vancouver to pick out their own chattels. As I believe about forty Japanese had their chattels stored here, I doubt very much that any half dozen members of the association would be able to straighten out this chaotic mess. I would recommend their visit, however, if it served no other purpose than that of having the place cleaned up and put in some semblance of order.

As the B. C. Security Commission had accumulated sufficient Custodian releases to justify the opening of the premises at 573 East Hastings St., I telephoned Mr. Molonnen of Nor-is & Molonnen, the legal representative of the Association, and suggested to them that they should bring the key, and accompany the Custodian officials, and members of the B. C. Security Commission, to arrange identification of the chattels.

At 9:00 A.M. today we all met as arranged and Mr. Molonnen with the key attempted to open the front door. This proved impossible as there appeared to be some obstruction inside, quite apart from the bad condition of the lock on the door. Eventually we were able to gain entry through the rear door and were then able to understand why the front door could not be forced. Thieves had entered by the front door, and had placed large planks against the door, preventing the opening of it which would insure their uninterrupted examination of all the chattels, most of which appeared to have been packed in boxes. The lids had been torn off the boxes and contents ransacked and scattered over the floor, and piled up in a state of utter confusion, making shipment impossible. Both Mr. Molonnen and the B. C. Security Commission representative realized the futility of attempting to identify and separate the chattels, so the truck was dismissed.

Mr. Molonnen called in detectives who made a cursory examination and left without making comments. This particular location is the hangout corner of the worst element in Vancouver.

All chattels were eventually moved to our car house and sold by public auction.

Mr. Molonnen sent a representative who in company with our Mr. D.A. Smith spent about one week identifying chattels on the basis of a list supplied by Mr. Molonnen. This identification was accomplished only with extreme difficulty.

Under the aforementioned circumstances, the Custodian can assume no responsibility for anything that may be missing.

MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Tanaki, Ichitaro, No. 95 on the Secretary's list.

(MRS) ICHITARO TANAKI the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the official interpreter as follows:

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave, your honour, to amend this claim by deleting the items under 5 (e); those are abandoned in toto; and under 4 (e) 10 (3), that item of \$1200.00 has been amended to read \$477.50 and that is for store fixtures only. There is no claim for goodwill. We credit the Custodian with \$156.55, leaving a net and total claim herein of \$320.95.

THE COMMISSIONER: Amendment allowed.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the store fixtures for which you have submitted a claim. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to 20 prepare this statement for you and is that your signature?

THE WITNESS: A: Yes.

Q: And in your statement you make reference to a list of items, the value of which you estimate to be \$477.50 in your statement. I produce to you a list. Is this the list to which you make reference? A: Yes.

your knowledge and recollection?

THE INTERPRETER: A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave to file the statement and the list, your honour, as one exhibit.

(STATEMENT AND LIST MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit 1, the statement portion of exhibit 1, the witness says that the goods claimed were left in the store at 501 Burrard Street, Vancouver, and were later moved by the Custodian to his storage at 992 Powell Street, Vancouver. The only comment she makes is that she has allowed for depreciation on the articles claimed.

Would my learned friend produce the signed inventory dated August 31, 1942, signed that is, by the claimant?

MR. McINNIS: Yes. I produce, your honour, a signed inventory, purporting to be signed by Mrs. I. Tanaki, dated the 31st of August '42, headed, "Goods on Hand at 992 Powell Street."

MR. COBUS: Q: Witness, I produce to you a list of articles dated August 31, 1942. From whom did you receive this list? Perhaps I had better go back on that -- is that your signature?

THE WITNESS: A: Yes.

Q: From whom did you receive this list?

A: From the Custodian.

Q: You received it from the Custodian?

A: Yes.

Q: And you signed it and returned it? A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I file the signed inventory as the next exhibit, your honour.

(INVENTORY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

MR. COBUS: I don't think the Analysis in this case is of much assistance, your honour, since we have abandoned the items under "Personal Property" on the claim form.

10 CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. McINNES:

Q: You had had these two cash registers that you claim since 1935? A: Yes.

Q: They were second hand, of course, when you bought them? A: Second hand.

Q: Who did you buy them from?

A: When we bought the store.

Q: I beg your pardon? A: 1935, when we bought the store, that time I bought them.

Q: Oh, I see, you took them over as part of the store. A: Yes.

Q: What kind of a store was this? A: Grocery and confectionery.

Q: And you bought it as a going concern in 1935? A: Yes.

Q: Now, when you bought it, did you just pay a lump sum price, if you know what I mean, for the whole business? A: I paid for the fixtures and the groceries.

Q: Well, you just paid so much money for the whole thing, did you? A: Yes.

Q: Do you understand me? A: Yes.
Q: How much did you pay? A: \$2000.00.
Q: \$2000.00. So that when you say here in this list that you paid \$85.00 for the two cash registers, actually, you don't know how much you paid for them, do you? A: Oh, yes, the man figured how much. \$1000.00 I paid for the fixtures.

Q: Yes, but you paid \$2000.00 for the whole thing, cash registers, business and all. A: No.

A: Yes.

Q: And you say that in 1935 you paid \$100.00 for those. A: I bought that one.

Q: I beg your pardon? A: I bought that one myself.

Q: You bought that yourself? A: Yes.

Q: Well, you say here you got it approximately in 1935 and it was second hand when you bought it.
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A: Yes, I bought it.

Q: Where did you buy it? A: I don't know
the name of the second hand store.

Q: You bought it from a second hand store?

A: Yes.

Q: And you paid them \$100.00 for it? A: Yes.

Q: At the time of purchase, were you given a list of the store fixtures that were there?

A: Well, I haven't got any list.

Q: You may not have it, but were you given one then? Perhaps you don't remember.

MR. COBUS: All right. Nothing more, your honour.

10 If it please your honour, it seems to me we should have in the auction sheets, if the Crown wouldn't mind producing them. There are three yellow sheets indicating the sales which were made by the Custodian, and it will be noted by the Commissioner that she is not claiming for all of the items, but that all of the items can be found somewhere on the three sheets.
