

MEMORANDUM -- MR. ROBINSON

January 6, 1947

Re: Fishing nets belonging to
Gangi Terashima, Deceased

In his Declaration of April 13, 1942, Gangi Terashima declared 4 cork lines, 2 nets, 5 spring nets and 5 leads, stored at the Imperial Cannery, Steveston, B. C. He did not give the sizes of his nets.

Gangi Terashima enquired about his fishing equipment on November 14, 1942, and on November 18, 1942, he was advised that the Custodian was still engaged in inventorying the supplies and fishing equipment, and would be in touch with him when completed. On May 3, 1943, the Custodian sent Gangi Terashima an inventory form to fill out and give the exact sizes of his fishing nets. A letter was received from Gangi on May 8, 1943, from which he admitted to enclose the inventory form, and at that time, he stated the place he stored his nets was at: "Mr. Chokichi Nishimura's (or formerly was) net house." On May 17, 1943, Mr. Robinson, the Custodian's agent at Steveston, was requested to check this location. Detailed inventory received on May 26, 1943.

A memo appears on file, dated May 31, 1943, and from this memo it appears that Mr. Robinson of the Steveston office was in touch with the Net Department in this office, and from this memo it also appears that they could not find any net house under the name of Nishimura, but believed this net house to be the Imperial Cannery Cold Storage, situated on the Imperial Cannery property. In this net house was found, on October 15, 1942, a few items of cork lines and net floats, under the name of Terashima, no initial. Mr. Robinson states that no fishing nets could be found when he entered this building, and he also states that it is quite possible that Gangi Terashima's nets were taken by other fishermen before he had an opportunity to inventory.

A further letter was received from Gangi Terashima on January 18, 1945, again enquiring about his nets, but he died before this letter could be answered.

In a telephone conversation on January 4, 1947, Mr. Eric Lane of the Imperial Cannery, stated that G. Nishimura, at no time, had a net house on the property of the Imperial Cannery. A Mr. E. Sainoto was the head fish buyer and was instructed to have all the fishermen under his control, Gangi Terashima being one, to enter into a record book which the B. C. Packers supplied, all the nets and fishing equipment that they were leaving in the Protected Area, giving the location where they were stored, and he, at that time, informed the Japanese fishermen that the Cannery would not take any responsibility for their nets.
