

Bigamy Charged

Claim Woman Had Chinese, Jap Husbands

A Japanese woman alleged to have two husbands—one Japanese, the other Chinese—appeared before Magistrate H. S. Wood on a charge of bigamy in Police Court today.

The woman, Mrs. Kiyu Shimizu, 45, pleaded not guilty to going through a form of marriage with a Chinese, Mah Jack, Winters Hotel, 205 Abbott, while her husband was still alive.

Rev. W. E. Galloway, pastor of St. James' United Church, testified that he had performed a wedding ceremony for the couple in First United Church last August 25.

An R.C.M.P. constable, R. A. Davidson, told the court that the Japanese woman had registered with the R. C. M. P. under the name Shimizu in January, and came back in September to register a second time under the name Mrs. Mah Jack.

Mah Jack claimed he had known the woman for ten years, and had asked her to marry him when she had said: "No husband. All finished. He dead."

She had claimed to the R. C. M. P. that her Japanese husband, Yuki Frank Shimizu, was dead—but the files show he is in an internment camp, according to Davidson. This fact was corroborated by Canadian Provost Corps Captain Frederick Lake, who told of seeing the Japanese in an Ontario internment camp last November.

Magistrate Wood adjourned the case until Friday.
