CLASSIFICATION: There is no report by the inspector referring to this land. The owner declared a farm of 10 acres of which $\frac{1}{2}$ acre was in strawberries and a frame house 10 x 20.

HISTORY OF ADMINISTRATION: From the file it would appear that this property was occupied by B.E. LIDSTONE as tenant from the owner during the season of 1942, and as the account is credited with \$25.38 on the 3rd November 1942, it is presumed that this represents rental received from Lidstone.. On the 19th March 1943, the Custodian leased the property to C.B. TELFORD for 10 months as from the 1st March 1943 to the 31st December 1943 with storage space for chattels reserved. The consideration in this lease was that the lessee should pay the taxes for 1943. Whether he did so or not is not on record.

SOLD: To The Director The Veterans' Land Act for \$171.00 as at 1st January 1943.
Approval of Advisory Committee 1st June 1943.

FUNDS: Released to the credit of Kesaguma UCHIMARU, sale price \$171.00, plus rental \$25.38, total \$196.38; less Certificate of Encumbrance \$1.00, registration fee \$3.00, legal fee \$15.00, total \$19.00, Net amount released \$177.38.

TITLE: Included in C. of T. 169888-E and payment of consideration included in cheque to the Custodian dated March 22nd, 1944.

PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

5th October, 1946.

Re: Kesaguma UCHIMARU / Reg. No. 13533

CHATELS: The above Japanese declared no chattels and although copies of correspondence appears on this file, the chattels belonged to his son, but were left on his father's property. They are being dealt with however, on the son's file.

SPECIFIED ARTICLES: The above Japanese declared a truck surrendered at Hastings Park. He had however, transferred his truck to the Pacific Co-operative Union for sale prior to the surrender date, and the truck was therefore released to the Pacific Co-operative Union. The P.C.U. sold the truck for \$500.00 of which they paid \$475.00 to UCHIMARU prior to his evacuation and remitted the balance of \$25.00 to this office to his credit on the 10th April, 1943. Details are shown on the attached brown-edged summary.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE: The above Japanese declared he and two other Japanese had a claim of \$171.75 against B.E. Lidstone for wages. The Custodian after considerable trouble collected the sum of \$143.98, against this account of which \$56.08 was distributed to UCHIMARU's account as he was advised in our letter of the 12th June, 1944 which he acknowledged.

A small credit balance of \$2.25 in his Grever's account at the P.C.U. was forwarded to his credit here on the 3rd Nov. 1942.

BONDS & INVESTMENTS: UCHIMARU declared a share equity in the P.C.U. which according to their records amounted to \$270.00 in redeemable shares and \$490.00 in unredeemable shares. Of the former, those issued in the years 1937 to 1940 inclusive were redeemed at par for \$200.00, from time to time, and were credited to his account here, together with \$12.58 interest. His \$70.00 worth of 1941 shares should be redeemed early in 1947. He forwarded all his share certificates to this office but at his request we returned his non-redeemable share certificate on the 3rd October, 1946.

He also owned a \$10.00 United Farmers Co-operative Exchange share. This was sold by the Custodian for \$65.00 which sum together with \$3.20 interest on same, was credited to his account here as received. Upon advising him of this, he forwarded his share certificate to this office.

LIFE INSURANCE: UCHIMARU declared a Western Mutual Benefit Association policy for \$1000.00. This however was not brought under control by, or administration of the Custodian.

This file reveals no other Personal Property assets.

The Pacific Co-operative Union filed a claim for \$119.95. A later statement dated the 31st October 1942 shows that there was owing to Kenaguma UCHIMARU - \$2.25 which was paid to the Custodian on November 3, 1942.

UCHIMARU sent an account for \$85.00 owing to Dr. Tai Kusuvara asking that we send him funds with which to pay it. The account was not actually paid from this office but UCHIMARU apparently paid it from remittances sent to him as in his letter of January 29, 1946 he states he had settled the account. In this same letter he added that he had a further liability to Dr. Kusuvara, however, no claim has been filed against him here and no action will be taken by this office unless asked to do so.

This file reveals no other liabilities.

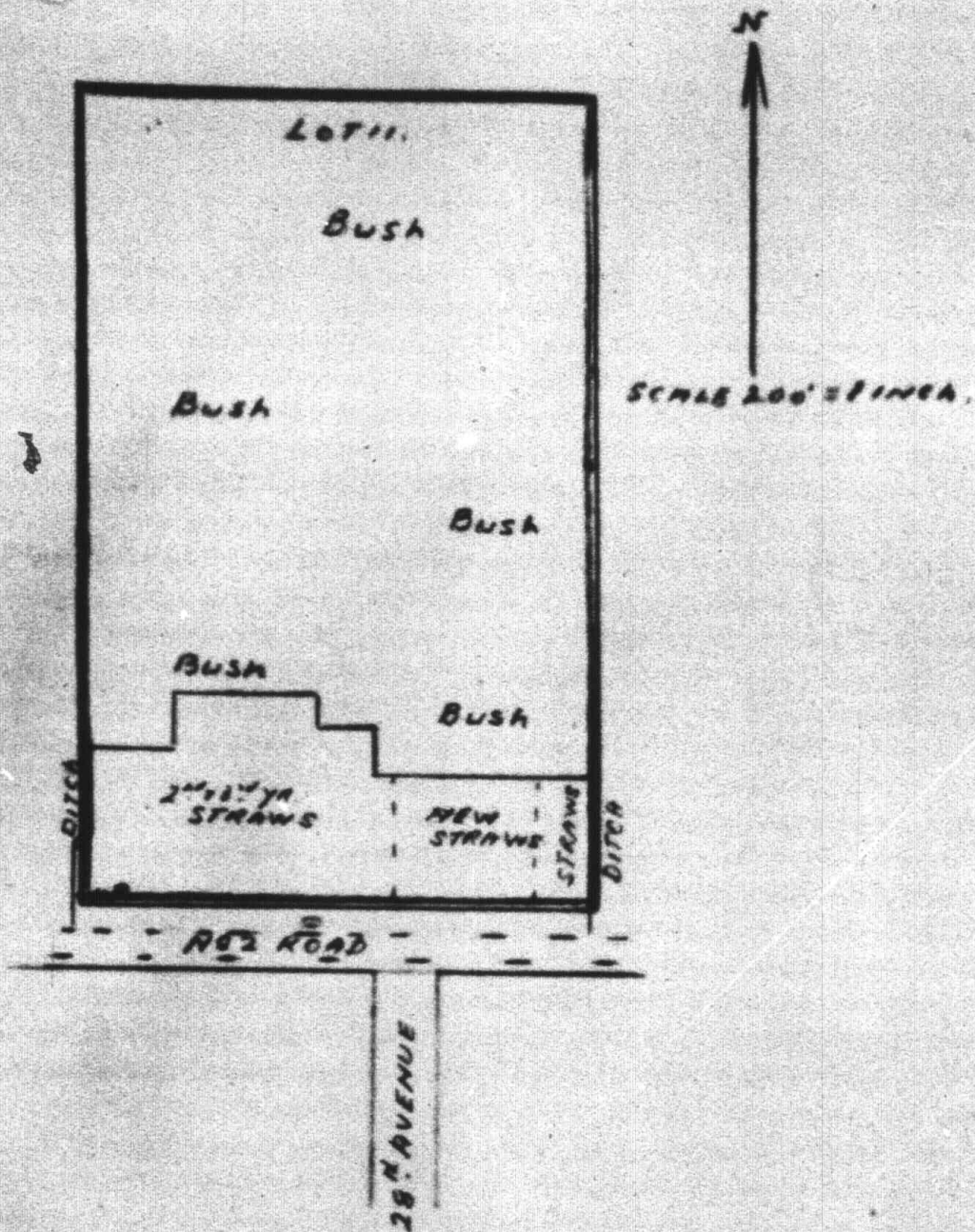

Mr. Nielsen, tenant of Inosuke Nishikawa's property, file 3397, called on February 10th, 1944, with a letter from Kesaguma Uchimaruru, copy of which is attached. This letter refers to one from Mr. Nielsen reporting theft from certain boxes left in his care. We were notified of this theft in letters of December 7th, 1942, and January 12th, 1943, on file 3397.

From the second of these two letters it appears that two boxes of kitchenware belonged to Iwao Uchimaruru, file 9621.

It will be noted from the attached copy of Kesaguma Uchimaruru's letter that he asks that one box be shipped to S. Shigetomi, who is not registered at present. Mr. Nielsen advises that the contents of the two boxes after having been ransacked, will just fill one box and as he cannot identify the contents which were scattered about at the time of the robbery, he will ship one box containing everything, to S. Shigetomi.

Kesaguma Uchimaruru who is Iwao Uchimaruru's father, and S. Shigetomi, are being so advised and confirmation of this arrangement is going forward to Mr. Nielsen.

Q. Mr. Uchimaru, is this your signature on this

helpful in this matter, and frankly what bothers me is this -- I read the Farm Appraisal Report which puts a value on the strawberries of \$50. an acre -- now the claimant puts it in at \$500. an acre. What I am trying to arrive at is, has he anything in mind in making up his valuation that might have been overlooked by the appraiser for the Farm Appraisal Board. If there is, I think he should tell us what it is.

THE INTERPRETER: He is trying to arrive at this by an estimation of the price, and the man finds it difficult to do so. He is trying to estimate the price of the strawberries and the cost of clearing it.

MR. CHRISTIE: I do not wish to press this point if he cannot answer it. If he cannot give me any reason for it I will have to leave it.

MR. PERVIN: He has given you some reason already.

MR. CHRISTIE: That is the end of my examination. By way of defence it is submitted that the real property was sold at its fair market value, and I am tendering the Real Property Summary as Exhibit 6.


