

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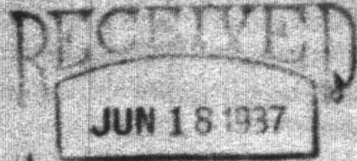

Thank you very much for your letter dated July 27th.

We appreciate very much indeed your having sent to us duplicate copies of the JP forms sent to you with our letter dated July 18th. We are glad to observe that the information now provided by you, is somewhat more extensive than the information recorded by us at the time your assets were registered on April 21st.

At this time we would be indebted to you if you would kindly provide us with your comments in connection with the following claims we now have on file:

- (1) We received a claim for \$20.42 from the Routledge Motors Limited, Mission, against Mr. T. Amemori, in respect to which the claimants have obtained a Court judgment. We understand that the figure of \$20.42 represents an unpaid balance on your account with them.
- (2) We have received from Messrs. Woodworth & Woodworth Limited a claim for \$25.00 due to Dr. C.E. Brown covering services rendered to some members of the Amemori family. We have on file an acknowledgment signed by A. Amemori acknowledging the correctness of this figure. *akiko*

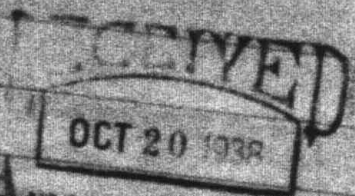


