Dear Madam:

Thank you for your letter of June 5th listing the articles which you left stored in the rear dwelling house basement of Mr. K. Imai, and also the enclosed lists from your husband. This, I am sure, will prove very useful when the goods removed from that address and stored in our Warehouse, are brought into our auction room and sold. Some of the goods already have been sold and the proceeds credited to your husband's account. These consist of a scale, one dozen chairs, one kitchen stove, one heater stove, and some dishes.

We have asked our Steveston representative to try and locate the band saw and 4 H.P. engine said to be stored in S. Hato's net house. We will advise you of the result of this investigation.

Turning now to the list of boat lumber said to be stored in the house of Y. Kitada at the Pacific Coast Cannery, we regret to say we have no trace of ever having moved this lumber, and fear that it has been stolen, as there was a great deal of pilfering at Steveston the latter part of 1942 and the early part of 1943.
