My Dear Mary Ann.

I am in receipt of copy of a letter dated April 18th written you by S.B. Buesenbury of the office of the Custodian Vancouver B.C. wherein you were informed that I am prepared to pay you the sum of \$10.00 for two pieces of furniture which you stored at my house when you left our employment.

I quite incorrectly informed the Custodian that the furniture consisted of a dresser and an incomplete bed. I was so informed by Mrs Wilkinson as I was absent from Vancouver when the material was stored.

Today, Peter and I unearthed it from under a pile of empty boxes and wood and found two dressers. One male and one female. It has of course deteriorated very materially from such a long storage in the basement and frankly is not worth a cent more than ten dollars.

I am therefore enclosing my cheque for \$10.15 which includes bank exchange .15 cents in full payment and trust that this is satisfactory to you.

We were all very surprised to hear of your residence in Ontario as we were under the impression that you were still at New Denver.

We understand that you are married now and of course we all wish you every happiness in your new life. Mrs Wilkinson and I are leaving Vancouver to take up residence in the Cariboo where I propose to operate a cattle ranch and summer resort. We wish that you were out here and could work for us as we have a very favourable recollection of what a splendid and faithful worker you were when you were with us. We have quite a large Japanese colony near our Ranch at Lone Butte.

Peggy should graduate from University this month. Peter should enter that institution in the fall. I am happy to say that Buster Ted returned from the wars unscathed and is now practising law in Vancouver.
