Dear Sir:

I, Mitsuo Nakashiba, a Canadian born Japanese (Reg. No. 00657), now residing at the above address since leaving Sardon, B.C., almost six months ago, would deem it a great privilege if you would be so kind enough to render me the following favour.

The favour is this. I would like to have released to me either one or both of the radio receiving sets which are held in your custody, and which are, furthermore, registered in my mother's name, Mrs. Muyo Nakashiba. By preference, if in the case both radios cannot be released, I would like to have the smaller Sparlon mantle set.

A description of the radios in question and in your custody are:

As these radios are registered in my mother's name, I have asked her if she would be willing to transfer the ownership of the radios to me. In reply, my mother stated that she was quite willing to transfer the ownership of the radios to me.

Previous to this letter, on February 16, 1944, I had written to the R.C.M.P. Office in Vancouver, B.C. on this matter of release, etc. I had since received a reply in this regard from Constable R. A. Davidson, Japanese Registration "E" Division, who kindly advised me that the radios were now in your custody, and that I should get in touch with the Custodian Office on this matter.

Moreover, previous to the sending of the above letter to the R.C.M.P. in Vancouver, I had made inquiry at the R.C.M.P. office in Hamilton as to what would be the best manner to contact those concerned on this matter. The R.C.M.P. officer in Hamilton advised me that my mother and

I should each send a letter to those concerned asking for the transfer of the ownership and for the release of the radios. In this regard, both of us sent letters to the R.C.M.P. Office in Vancouver.

If in the case that you are able to release either one or both of the radios to me, I am willing to pay for all expenses incurred in the handling and transportation of them to me.

Would be much obliged for an answer at your earliest convenience.
