CHattel Summary

SARAYAMA, Wataru, Reg. No. 07800,

Mrs. SARAYAMA declared on May 21, 1942, a large chest containing the following, left at 302 East Cordova:

Dishes - cups, jugs, bottles  
Battery charge  
Aerial Electric wires sockets  
Blackout shades  
Gas lines  
Garbage can  
Victor record player  
Assorted records  
Lacrosse sticks  
Books  
Set thrift sign makers  
Roller skates  
Miscellaneous articles  
Yellow cedar trunk.

Wataru SARAYAMA declared on April 11, 1943 a large cedar trunk containing, dishes, books, records and a record player, and miscellaneous household goods, but did not state where they were stored.

The chest was removed to 992 Powell Street, on June 15, 1942 under the name of Hideo SARAYAMA, File 7433, daughter of the above. When the chest was removed the lock was found to have been forced and the following goods were missing:

Battery charge	Aerial wire
Sockets	Blackout shades
Gas lines	Garbage can

Mrs. SARAYAMA was advised of this on September 4, 1942. A recheck of 302 East Cordova was of no avail.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation borrowed 18 Gramophone records in May 1943 and returned them July 15, 1943. When the records were being removed, Mr. D. A. Smith noticed that the record player was missing. No trace of this has ever been found.

At her request the chest was forwarded to Mrs. SARAYAMA at Lethbridge in April 1945. The chest should have been sent collect, but, through an oversight this office paid the charges. The C. P. R. collected from Mrs. SARAYAMA \$10.27 which they remitted to us. The charges being \$8.72, the balance, \$1.55 was forwarded to Mrs. SARAYAMA, May 11, 1945.

The chest stored at 992 Powell Street as per Mr. Smith's memorandum of June 16th, was found with lock broken at the time of moving and Mr. Smith noticed a record player therein, value about \$8.00 or \$9.00. Some Japanese records were recently taken from this Japanese chest to rent to the C. B. C. and Mr. Smith then noticed that the record player was missing. It can only be assumed that this has been removed by some of the casual labour working at 992 Powell Street.
