This woman signed a declaration to the Custodian on May 7, 1942. She was evacuated on September 21, 1942.

In her declaration she reported 10 pieces of household effects left at the Japanese Hall, Paldi, B.C. 8 of these pieces were shipped to her in May, June and November, 1942. The remaining 2 pieces including a stove and table and chairs were sold at auction at Duncan, B.C. on March 15, 1945, and the net proceeds credited to the account of her husband, File No. 8257. As these proceeds are being applied on a claim against this woman we are not transferring the proceeds to her account.

re: Claim \$189.00 and \$26.00 -
Dr. Bissett, Watson etc.

On receipt of your further information relative to the claim of \$189.00, we wrote to Mrs. NIIYA submitting both of these claims to her for payment. We have now received her answer and we quote her letter in full as the best means of conveying her reply to you:-

"I just received your letter and there must be some mistake. In it it says I owe \$189.00. I have never been sick so I couldn't have any such bill.

"But the latter \$26.00 I do owe Dr. Watson. The day before I left Duncan I paid him as much as I could. And I said I would pay the rest when I go back after this is all over. I made this agreement at the doctor's office with the secretary.

"If we were getting regular wages here I certainly would pay them back. We scarcely could eat here. I guess you know that.

"My mother did have an kidney operation about seven years ago and died soon after the operation but dad paid every bit of that bill. He even took all the money he had in the bank in Japan to pay that bill.

"So they must have forgotten to write paid all in their bills. Of course this is one time we wished we had the receipt to that bill but that was such a long time. And that was to Dr. Watson too. We have nothing to do with the rest of the doctors.

"I may sound awfully harsh but I hate being accused
of owing money when I don't."

By this it is noted that she denies definitely
the \$189.00 claim and admits the \$26.00 but is not in a position
to pay the latter one. We cannot add anything to this report
of course, and hence believe it best to leave the adjustment
of both these items to you.

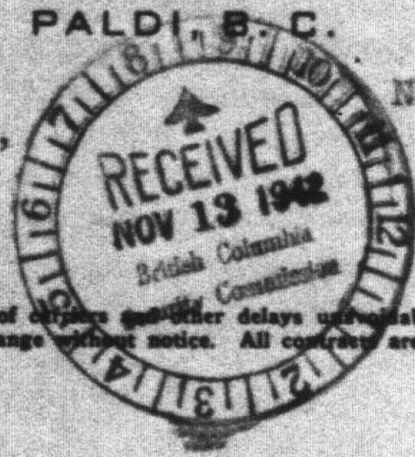

Dear Sir:

Replying to your letter of September 21st re Minoru Adachi, #09038.

We beg to advise that the Japanese formerly living here stored their household goods in the Japanese Hall at Paldi, but just what was stored in this hall, the Company has no way of knowing, as we were not given a list or a record of each individuals personal property.

The understanding with Mr. T. Urabe, the Japanese Foreman while working for this Company, was that they could store their chattels in the hall and we would ship out anything they ordered, if it was possible. Since then, we have shipped considerable items to them as per instructions from your office. Records of which we have here. But as to what is left in the hall, we have no record.

We shipped for M. Adachi six pieces as per your order dated July 27th signed by Mr. J. A. Rose of the B. C. Security Commission.
