Dear Madam:

Re: Tokuichi Yamasaki - Registration No. 14010

We have your letter of March 10 enquiring concerning proceeds from sale of the Fargo Truck belonging to your son, Tokuichi Yamasaki.

We enclose a statement of account, showing a balance of \$317.96 to the credit of Tokuichi Yamasaki which includes \$186.40, being the net proceeds from the sale of the truck.

We wish to explain to you that this sum can only be disbursed by this office to your son or his legal representative. We have obtained a report from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police which indicates that his whereabouts is unknown but there is no proof that he is dead. It will, therefore, be necessary to obtain a Court Order presuming him dead after which an Administrator should be appointed to administer his estate. If Tokuichi is proved to be dead and single at the time of his death, and if he left no Will, according to Canadian law his Estate will be divided equally between his mother and father if both have survived him. It will, however, be necessary for the Court to appoint a legal representative to receive the funds from the Custodian.

Under the circumstances, we would suggest that you go to a lawyer who will advise you how to proceed in this matter.

We attach a copy of the report made by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to this office, dated March 28, 1949, together with a statement of account as mentioned above.
