Young and a copy of my reply. I would appreciate if you would discuss this situation with Mr. Field and let me have his side of the story. McPherson, Esq., Precutive Assistant, Department of the Secretary of State, Ottawa, Onterio. Dear Mr. McPherson: -As you no doubt remember, I am the solicitor of Tairiku Nippo which is known in English as the Continental Daily News and which has its place of business and printing establishment at #213-215 Cordova Street, East, Vancouver, B.C. This property, the legal description of which is Lot 11 and 12. Block 5, D.L. 196, is owned by Mrs. Midori Iwasaki who is also the principal shareholder of the publishing company. There is a small mortgage on this property in favour of either Shinkichi Tamura deceased, or the Japan and Canada Trust Savings Company and it appears that there is now owing under it the sum of \$3,800.00 as the balance of principal and a sum in the neighbourhood of \$200.00 for interest. A few days ago, I was told by Mr. Prederick Field that he intends to bring foreclosure proceedings in regard to this mortgage unless something is done immediately to liquidate this debt. Mr. Field and your local office seem to think that because Mrs. Iwasaki has two or three thousand dollars in the bank she should pay off this mortgage. But she refuses to do so, contending that this money is kept by her for the education and advancement of her children and that she may have to use some of this money to support herself and her dependent children during the time she and her husband are unable to earn money or carry on any business. They are not the type who can eary their living by manual labour no matter how willing they are. Under these circumstances, you will agree with me that her

attitude is not an unreasonable one.

The printing plant and the building have been left for me to look after and I have been trying to rent them to a Chinese organization for newspaper publishing purposes. I am told that about 35% of the Japanese ideograph types of the Tairiku Nippo can be used by the Chinese and I believe this quantity of types is sufficient to publish a Chinese newspaper. I have carried on negotiations with the head of a Chinese syndicate since last summer, but as yet I have not been able to get anywhere, still I have hopes that eventually I will succeed if once the Chinese will realise that this cannot be acquired at a distress price. I am convinced that if I can rent them to the Chinese at a reasonable rental, this arrangement will prove to be the most advantageous one to all concerned for the following reasons:

If the building has to be rented for any other purpose or has to be sold, the printing machinery and equipment must be removed from it and this I understand will entail an expenditure of many thousands of dollars and if the printing machinery, etc., which were purchased and assembled at the cost of over \$35,800.00 have to be sold, they will bring not more than \$5000.00.

The land was purchased by me on behalf of the publisher in 1925 for the sum of \$8000.00 and the building was erected on it in 1927 by the architect and contractors selected by me at the cost of \$31,000.00. I am told and I believe, that if the publication had not been suspended soon after December 7th 1941, and members of the company not evacuated, this mortgage debt would have been paid off in full long before this.

In view that there is ample security for this mortgage notwithstanding that two years' taxes amounting to about \$1500.00 remain unpaid, I would ask you to prevent any action being taken until I have exhausted every means to make the printing plant and the building revenue producing. Section 51 of the Revised Regulations appears to give you this power. Under the circumstances. I feel that even after foreclosure proceedings are started, the Court would grant time, but this will burden the property with costs of both sides and it is my earnest desire to avoid this. I believe that I told you before that this newspaper was founded over thirty years ago by Mr. Yasushi Yamazaki and that at all times he endeavoured to promote the friendliest relations and commerce between the British Commonwealth of nations and Japan, also to Canadianise the Japanese and has recruited Japanese for overseas military service during the first World War. I know from personal knowledge, he constantly opposed the meddling in the affairs of the local Japanese by the representative of the Japanese Government. I also know that due to this opposition and his independent attitude. his newspaper was boycotted by the Japanese merchants and others, but that did not alter his determination to be independent. I cannot see what will happen to this newspaper after the war but in the meanwhile it is my intention and desire to do everything possible to prevent the assets of my clients being sacrificed and to this end I seek your co-operation. Knowing well that it is your policy to deal justly and fairly in these matters, I bring to your attention these facts so that the enemy interest (I use the word "enemy" literally and advisedly after what "Noritake" did) will not be considered by you of paramount importance over that of my clients. I noticed in the newspaper a few days ago, that another Manitoban was selected to an important mission. This time to inquire into the Japanese living conditions in the interior. It is very unfortunate for me that I do not come from your Province --- if I did, I might get somewhere. Do you know any way to turn me into a Manitoban? By the time this letter reaches you, it will be 1944, so I wish you and yours and the baby (congratulations) a very Happy New Year. I would like you to do me a favour that is, to convey on my behalf the seasons felicitations to our Good Doctor the Under-Secretary of State. four file has now been reviewed and we take this opportunity of giving you a brief summary of our administration of your affairs.

Iou declared yourself to be the holder of no real property in the Protected Area, but did state you were the owner of certain personal property which was left on your husband's property at Habey. These chattels remained there until sold at Public Auction on the 16th May, 1945, in accordance with the Canadian Government's policy of liquidation.

Details of the auction results were each to your hasband at his request, and we also informed him that articles stated by him to be missing from our auction results were either sold with the property as fixtures or were of such a nature that the expense of handling, hauling and auctioning would have exceeded their value, and they were therefore, abandoned on the property. The net sum derived from the saleable goods totalled \$14.43 and were credited to your account here.

When registering with this office, you stated that T. TAKATSU owed you the sum of \$63.25. TAKATSU acknowledged that this account was correct, and this sum was transferred from his account to yours at this office, in full settlement.

From the funds collected from T. TakaTSU, in accordance with your letter of the 19th May, 1942, payment was made on your behalf of the following accounts:-
