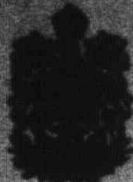

Replying to your letter of March 3rd, when registering with us this woman declared no assets of any sort. We have never received any money to her.

Your letter of October 16th, 1945 signed by C. W. Fisher inquired about 3 trunks and a sewing machine stored in her son's place, and our reply on 14th November, 1945 advised that the sewing machine had been sold and credited to her son's account and that adjustment for the sale price should be made between herself and her son.

On October 15, 1943 we inquired of the R.C.M.P. Division of your office for some particulars with regard to this woman. The information given us was that she was a farmer, the owner of property in her son's name. When her son registered with us he declared real and personal property which was sold by us and credited to his account. At present his credit balance on our books amounts to \$2,110.44, and he has lodged a claim against the Dominion Government for \$7,932.00 covering his real property plus an additional claim of \$1,500.00 for his personal property.
