

I received your letter and also Crown Life Policy Premium noted.

In regarding about this policy, before I leave Vancouver I met Japanese Agent Mr. Gaba and discuss about this matter. Mr. Gaba told me he's going to adjust some way until the war is over, so I thought this case is stand in abeyance until the war ends.

But according your letter I have to pay \$22.62. I would like to send the money but meantime I have no money to pay. Therefore I would suggest that I let the matter of settlement stand in abeyance and when conditions improve I can then provide for the amount. Is not good enough?

Anyway meantime I have no idea to fix up this matter, so if you know some way to fix up, will you please let me know?

We have received notice of premium of \$49.91 due on the 30th day of May on the above policy, and also a statement of Loan Interest of \$5.73 due and payable on the same date.

On May 31st, 1943, we also wrote to you in connection with this same policy with regard to premium and Loan Interest due on May 30, 1943. You replied to the effect that you had no means of paying these amounts and that the matter would have to stand in abeyance.

I expect that the same situation may exist now, but just in case that you may now be able to take care of this premium, we are notifying you herewith.

The premium notice and Loan Interest notice mentioned above will be filed in your husband's File 334.

For your information, there is still a credit balance in your husband's account of \$27.29. On request from your husband, we will use this credit balance to make a payment on the above premium, if you so desire, but, as you will note, the amount standing to his credit is approximately only half enough to take care of the current premium and Loan Interest.

Copy of this letter is being sent to the Internment Camp in order that your husband may be acquainted with this same information.
