We beg to acknowledge receipt of yours of the 9th and copy of letter received from Sadako Isoshima. The information given in her letter confirms our previous understanding that the period during which she earned the wages claimed was more than three months prior to the bankruptcy which took place on January 16th, 1942. We are therefore ranking her claim as an ordinary creditor and you can explain to her that under bankruptcy rules only the wages earned within three months prior to the bankruptcy are ranked as preferred.

The period of her employment was prior thereto and consequently she has no preference. The wage claims that were paid by us were due to employees who were working right up to the time of the assignment and for the period of three months prior thereto.
