**MEMORANDUM**

Files 5076 & 12113

May 12, 1948

Real Claims of Teiichi MORISHITA #05057 & Kentaro EBISUZAKI #01945

The 9-room house at 466 East Cordova, owned by Mr. Morishita was occupied by Mr. Morishita and his nephew, Mr. Ebisuzaki, and the families of the two men.

On October 26, 1942, Mr. Shigeichi Uchibori handed to the Custodian a list of goods left at 466 E. Cordova, which he said Mr. Ebisuzaki had failed to report.

On December 8, 1942, Mr. Morishita sent to the Custodian a JP declaration with a list of goods left at 466 E. Cordova.

The two lists evidently deal with the same group of chattels. The goods removed from 466 E. Cordova by the Custodian carried no identification. The proceeds of the sale of the articles sold were credited originally to Mr. Kentaro Ebisuzaki's account, but later placed in Custodian Suspense Account. Some of the goods from 466 E. Cordova were abandoned as valueless. The following were handed to the B.C.S.C. for shipment to Mr. Ebisuzaki on April 24, 1944, in response to his request.

Both of these men have filed claims. The claim of Mr. Morishita was heard at Nelson (Case No. 364). The claim of Mr. Ebisuzaki is to be heard by the Sub-Commissioner at Toronto.

Attached is a list of the goods from 466 E. Cordova, which have been accounted for, showing which of these items have been subjects of claim by each of the two men. It will be seen that each has claimed for 5 dressers - only 3 chests of drawers were removed from 466 E. Cordova. Each has claimed for chinaware, glassware & silverware. He sold goods of this nature to the sales value of \$25.45. It is probable that the same dressers are being dealt with in each claim, and possible that the same chinaware, glassware & silverware is dealt with in each claim.

We are removing from Suspense Account the proceeds of the articles ticked in red, as there is no doubt that these articles are claimed by Mr. Ebisuzaki and that Mr. Morishita has no interest.

However, there is one point I would like to explain to you. There was an agreement between Mr. Shigeichi Uchibori and me that Mr. Uchibori was to report all household things in my name when he evacuated. This arrangement was made because I allowed him to live there for a few months and secondly I was not able to walk around to make a complete check on my belongings.

I am trying to get a few articles sent to me again through local B. C. Security Commission. They will ask you for the release in due course. Thank you again for your full report regarding my account.

I have received quite a number of articles which you have released and sent through the hands of B.C.S.C. Thank you very much.

However, I am notified by B.C.S.C. to the fact that you could not locate glass and kitchenware at 466 East Cordova Street where we left almost everything of our possessions. I am very much surprised and hurt very deeply because I remember so well that one of your clerks at 314 Powell Street distinctly and confidently assuring me of your protections of my things.

You realize, no doubt, I am made penniless and without a fairly large sum of money or household needs--especially kitchenware--I cannot realize my moving to East.

Among my belongings, I left office desk, typewriter desk, and an adding machine. I want this adding machine sent to me.

I would like to know very much what articles of mine are stored in your storage. Will you please let me know as soon as possible.

I deeply regret that I have not answered your letter of September 2, regarding an offer you received on my washing machine.

At that time, I had no plan for my future and were feeling very bitter toward everything of life out here.

No doubt, you have read of re-location of Japanese in Eastern Canada where better opportunities are awaiting for us. I have intention of moving with my family to East in near future. I am very much in need of china-ware--more than ever when I settle in East.

I left, among other items, a set of dinnerware. I do not remember the exact no. of pieces. Can you send these to me? The set consists of, dinner plates, bread plates, cups and saucers, desert bowls, cream and sugar bowls, vegetable bowl with cover, gravy bowl and a large bird plate, and perhaps few others. These are packed in a box.

There are also 30 odds of rice bowls with lids of two sizes--one's slightly larger than the others. There are about 2 dozen oval-shaped dishes with smaller cup-like dishes to match. These are of Japan make.

It would be very much appreciated if you would send the above three items to me as soon as possible.



On receipt of your letters of 25th August and 15th September the matter was referred to Legal Counsel who now advise that positive proof of debt must be produced to the Custodian before a definite decision can be given.

In view of the fact that when you registered with the Custodian you did not declare any claim against Teiji Morishita, and when Morishita registered on 8th December, 1942 he did not declare the liability which he now alleges to exist in your favour, positive proof must be produced to this office of the validity of the claim which you now make.


Please, therefore, send us by Registered Mail the original note signed by T. Morishita, as the typewritten copy sent us with your letter of 25th August is not sufficient.

If you or your uncle have any further original documents in support of the claim--your cancelled cheques or certificates from your bank that such cheques were paid from your account; receipts in your favour, signed by your uncle, if the amounts stated were paid in cash; any original letters or demands for payment which may have passed between your uncle and yourself relative to this matter.

Your file was sent to Toronto on 5th September last in connection with the hearing of your claim before the Claims Commission and has not yet been returned to us but we expect to receive it before the end of this month. We will then be in a position to consider the matter of your claim against T. Morishita and will require to have in our possession the documents mentioned above so that all evidence can be considered.

Please, therefore, send these documents at the very earliest opportunity.


Dear Sir:

MEMORANDUM TO FILES.

Re: MORISHITA, Teiji and EBISUZAKI, Kentaro.

Mr. Kentaro Ebisuzaki on File 12113 declared no personal property. He was living at 466 East Cordova St., the house of Mr. Teiji Morishita, File 5078.

Mr. Shigeichi UCHIBORI (File 7169 -- no personal property) submitted on October 26th, 1942 --

(1) Registration for Teiji Morishita on the grounds that the latter had left Vancouver early in March without registering. Shigeichi Uchibori merely declared the real estate and made no reference to personal property.

(2) Registration for Kentaro Ebisuzaki, being a list of effects at 466 East Cordova St. belonging to this Japanese, but not declared by him. We were requested to move these before the end of the month and they were moved shortly afterwards as per lists on both files.

On December 8th Teiji Morishita mailed us his Registration; he claimed that, as he had left the protected area before the opening of the Registration Bureau, his wife had tried to register on his behalf, but had been refused. This seems unlikely. He enclosed detailed lists and valuations of his effects.

It is almost impossible to check these with the actual effects stored, but the values appear most unreasonable, e.g. -- a Japanese Bath as installed, valued at \$150.00 and an Electric Singer Sewing Machine at \$450.00. As 992 Powell is tightly packed, it is not worth while moving these goods for examination and appraisal, but it should be noted that the values are in most cases probably much exaggerated.

EBISUZAKI signed a declaration to the Custodian on August 3, 1942. He was evacuated on September 9, 1942.

CHATELS

EBISUZAKI reported no personal property on his JP Form, but on October 26, 1942, Shigeichi UCHIBORI, File 7169, registered a large number of household furniture and effects in the name of EBISUZAKI. Apparently, EBISUZAKI and UCHIBORI both lived in the house owned by EBISUZAKI's uncle, Teiji MORISHITA, File 5078, at 466 E. Cordova. MORISHITA also lived in the house.

An undated inventory on file shows the goods removed from 466 E. Cordova to 992 Powell. It is stated on the inventory that it was impossible to identify and separate ownership of the chattels and so they were removed in the name of Kentaro EBISUZAKI or Teiji MORISHITA.

On December 8, 1942, a registration was received from Teiji MORISHITA, listing the personal property he declared left at 466 E. Cordova. Many of the items which he reported to be his were identical to those reported by UCHIBORI to be the property of Kentaro EBISUZAKI. With the exception of a few items which had been shipped to EBISUZAKI, the goods found at 466 E. Cordova were sold under the name of EBISUZAKI at Vancouver Auctions 35, 36, and 56. (See Chattel Schedule). However, it is doubtful whether or not EBISUZAKI is entitled to all the proceeds of these sales as there was only one set of goods removed from 466 E. Cordova and ownership was claimed by both EBISUZAKI and MORISHITA. The case has been discussed with the person who is handling MORISHITA's file and it has been decided to transfer the proceeds of the sales of the goods, amounting to \$251.04, to Chattel Suspense. EBISUZAKI's present whereabouts is unknown and it would not be sufficient to take MORISHITA's word if he alone were written to regarding the chattels. (See further particulars see memo of May 12/46)

The proceeds of the sale of a washing machine were credited to EBISUZAKI's account and remitted to him before the situation was realized.

MONEY OWING

EBISUZAKI reported an account of \$1,256.67 owing him by M. EBISUZAKI Co. He stated that he had loaned this amount to the Company in 1942. On September 27, 1943, the sum of \$628.33 was credited to his account, representing dividends on his claim. Of this amount, \$283.50 was used to pay claims filed against EBISUZAKI and the remainder was sent to him in four remittances as maintenance.

An additional \$100.53 was credited to his account from the same source. As EBISUZAKI's whereabouts is unknown, this amount cannot be remitted to him at the present time. (Remitted Jan. 21/1946, Ph.)

LIFE INSURANCE

EBISUZAKI reported a policy with the Prudential Insurance Company. This was not brought under the control of the Custodian.

This file reveals no other property.
