In accordance with your instructions, I have investigated and taken control of the property of the above man recorded on his registration form as follows:

Real Property:

"At P. O. Box #10. Owns 4 room, 1 storey
wooden frame bungalow at Ucluelet, B. C. Also 1
36 x 24 net house. Property owned by Mrs. Almer
Ranch, Ucluelet, B. C. Declarant pays #25. per annum
for use of property. Paid to date."

Personal Property:

"Rishing gear, Sain net gear (old net), stored in Net house at Box #10, Ucluelet, B. C. (no key net house boarded)."

In connection therewith I have to report as follows:

1. Location:

This is a small Japanese settlement on the foreshore of Ucluelet Inlet about half a mile from the public wharf on land leased by the Lyche Estate. The house is listed with the Provincial Assessor at Alberni as House No. 12, Lyche's Bay, Ucluelet.

2. Ownership:

The two buildings are situated on property owned by

Mrs. Alma Littleton of Deluelet, B. C., Executrix of the A. H. Lyche

Estate. The "JP" Form shows Mrs. Almer Reech, of Ucluelet, as the

owner. This would appear to be incorrect, according to the

official records. Certificate of Title is No. 118274-I. As far as

can be ascertained there are no encumbrances.

The assessed value is \$250.00. Rental possibilities are nil.

5. Buildings:

The house is a four-room, one-storey frame bungalow and is about twenty-five years old. The house and net house are in poor condition. Rooms in the house are on the main floor.

The estimated sale value is \$150.00.

4. Inventory:

The house is vacant and there are no contents. Despite the statement in the "IP" Form that certain fishing gear is stored in the net house, nothing was found therein.

5. Insurance:

No insurance is carried on this property.

6. Liabilities:

There are no liabilities as far as can be ascertained, other than the taxes for 1942, which amount to \$7.50.

7. Recommendations:

As the buildings offer little or no prospect of rental and as the value thereof does not warrant insurance being taken out, no recommendation can be submitted in this regard.

As in previous reports of Japanese properties on the Lyche Estate, I would recommend that Mr. Littleton, the appointed agent for the Japanese, be approached with a view to ascertaining. 7. Recommendations: (continued)

exactly what the position is (a) respecting the re-occupation of the buildings by the owner should he be permitted to return,

(b) in the alternative, what compensation, if any, he proposes to make for the taking over of these buildings.

I have not been able to confirm the fact stated by the declarant, that a rental of \$25.00 per annum for use of the property has been paid in the past and that this rental was paid in full up to the time of evacuation.

Re: Shotaro SAKAI, #11982 In his declaration to the Custodian on August 8, 1942, this man reported a 4 room, 1 storey wooden frame bungalow at Ucluelet, B.C. Also a 36 x 24 net house. Property owned by Mrs. Almer Reech, Uclusiet, B.C. Declarant pays \$25.00 per annum for use of property. Paid to date. According to the report of Mr. H. G. Hinton dated September 30, 1942, the two buildings declared were situated on the property owned by Mrs. Alma Littleton of Ucluelet, executrix for the A. H. Lyche estate. These buildings were assessed at \$250.00. The dwelling house was a 4-room one-storey frame bungalow, about 25 years old. Both the net house and dwelling were, according to Mr. Hinton, in poor condition and he gave an The buildings belonging to this man were among a group of buildings owned by Japanese situated on the property belonging to the Lyche estate. According to Mrs. Littleton the lease whereby the Japanese were allowed to build houses on this property was to the effect that the houses would revert to the owner of the property if vacated. However, Mr. Littleton could not show any lease to this effect nor could any of the Japanese. According to a report by Constable D. H. Howell of the B.C. Police, on March 23, 1942, Mr. Littleton was going to rent the houses and forward half the rent to the Japanese and to allow them to move back after the war. However, no funds have been paid into this office in connection with this As there is no evidence of any written agreement between the property owner and the Japanese house-owners, this office can do nothing in regard to these buildings. In such cases the buildings revert to the owner of the land and unless the owner voluntarily pays the owner of the building for his equity in the house there is no means by which we can force payment) We have, in all such cases, left the matter in the hands of the two parties This file reveals no other real property. Dear Sir: There is a credit balance of \$53.29 standing in your account with this office. In your declaration to the Custodian you reported fishing gear and an old seine net in your net house at Ucluelet. However, when Custodian representative visited this net house following your evacuation nothing was found in the building. Goods stored at House No. 5, Ucluelet, identified as your property were sold at auction and the net proceeds in the amount of \$1.25 were credited to your account. The oil stove and tank reported by you as having been left at Hastings Park were sold at auction and the net proceeds in the amount of \$52.04 were credited to your account. In your declaration to the Custodian you reported ownership of a 4-room bungalow and net house built on property owned by Mrs. Almer Reech. As we informed you on October 3, 1942, this property is owned by the Lyche Estate, and we have been unable to establish that you have any legal equity in this property. It would appear that we have accounted for all the property of every kind left by you in the protected area, which vested in the Custodian, and in order that you may confirm this we enclose a stamped addressed envelope for your convenience in replying. In this case the Claiment, Esculchi Sakai, is claiming \$500, as half the value of a house stated by him to have been jointly owned by Same and his father, Shotare Sakai. He states in the Transcript, Page 5, that his father gave him his share in 1932.

The father, Shotare Sakai, declared, August 8, 1942, a four-wromed, one storey, bungalor and a 36 x 24 not house situated on land owned by the Lyche Retate, for which he claims be paid \$25,00 per annua ground rent to the administrator of the Lyche Estate at Saluelet. In support of his claim to comerchip, the Alberni-Clayquot Assessment District bills him as owner of approvements in 1942 valued at \$250,00. Shotare Sakai declared comerchip of goar and note stored in the net house and stated that as evacuation he boarded up the net house but moved his household chattels for storage to 80, 5 house, France's Bay. (This was meeticle Sapanese settlement on leased property.)

H. G. Histon of Goo. Touche & Company, Victoria, was instructed by the Custodian to investigate and reported fully on Sakai's property (September 30, 1942). He located the met house, bounded up. He states that the house is listed with the Provincial Assessor as House No. 12, Nyabes Nay, Univelet, and both buildings were located on property oaned by Mrs. Alms Editiotem, Breautriz of the Lyabe Setate. The house is described as a four-roused, frame bungalow about brenty-five years old, both house and not house in poor condition - house vacant and no contents. Nothing found in the net house. Estimated sale value \$150.00. He definite information as to loase arrangement but subsequent correspondence indicates that ground rent and taxes were paid by the owners of the houses through one of their number.

On March 23, 1942, Comst. D. H. Hovell, in charge of the Delumiet Detachment of the B. G. Pelies, reported to the Castodian giving a list of the Japanese concers of the buildings on the Lyche property. Opposite each building he placed a valuation which he stated in his report was given to him by the owner before evacuation. The value of Shotare Sakai's house was listed as \$350. Shotare Sakai was informed on October 3, 1942, that under the circumstances his equity in the house was doubtful. Shotare Sakai returned to Japan on May 31, 1946, and the Gustodian's last report to him again informed him that legal equity in the building had not been established.

Hama returned to Japan on Angust 2, 1946. Hama was also told that no legal equity in the building had been established. Assorting to Comst. Howall's report, Hama also valued his house at \$350.

Assessment Notice for 1942 of the Alberni-Clayquot Land District shows improvements valued at \$250.00 belonging to Hirokichi Hama.

Obviously Shotaro Sakai and Hirokichi Hama owned two separate cabins, each assessed at \$250.00 and valued by their respective owners at \$350.00.

There is no evidence anywhere that either of these owners made a gift to Kasuichi Sakai, the Claimant.

After the Japanese Bracuation, up until October-Bovember 1944, when the R.C.A.F. Station at Ucluslet was closed, some of the dwellings in this Japanese settlement were rented from Mrs Littleton by Air Force personnel who endeavoured to make necessary repairs to make them habitable.

During this period correspondence was carried on . between the Custodian and Mrs Littleton and her solicitor, Mr A. G. McCullock of Port Alberni. It was finally agreed that some compensation might be given to the Japanese for the buildings situated on the Estate property. As appraisal was therefore made by Mr G.H. Gilroy-Moore, together with Frank Everett representing the Lyche Estate. This appraisal dated October 23, 1944, signed by Mr. Gilray-Moore, was reported to the Custodias on October 24, 1944. At the time the appraisal was made some of the Air Force families were still in possession. The Appraiser stated that he had some difficulty in identifying some of the houses listed by Const. Howell and he was unable to definitely relate any value to houses belonging to either Hirokichi Hama or Shotaro Sakai, but house No. 12 stated by H.G.Hinton to belong to Shotaro Sakai, was valued by Mr Gilroy-Moore at \$250,00; the position is, therefore, briefly as follows. House Bo.12, identified as belonging to Shotaro Sakai, was assessed at \$250.00, declared by Shotaro Sakai to be worth \$350.00, stated by H.G.Hinton to have a sale value of \$150.00, and appraised by Mr Gilroy-Moore at \$250.00. Mr Gilroy-Moore in letters dated August 29, October 5, and October 24, 1944, amplifies statements made in his appraisal concerning the delapidated condition of these dwellings.

It should be noted that nowhere in reports made to the Custodian's office concerning this Japanese settlement is there any mention of an eight-roomed house owned by any person or persons. Further, not even a suggestion of a gift to Kasulchi Sakai can be found in the files of any of the persons concerned, nor did Kasulchi Sakai produce any proof of a gift at the time of the hearing. Kasulchi Sakai stated in his evidence that his father gave his his interest in the house in 1932 at which time Easulchi was seventeen years of age.

With reference to the settlement with the owner of the land, the Gustedian agreed to accept one-half of the appraiser's valuation of the buildings, namely \$577.50, the Lyche Estate to bear one-half of the cost of the appraisal. These funds have not yet been apportioned but it is proposed to apportion them in relation to the values given by the Japanese owners to Const. Howell in 1942. The total value according to the Japanese was \$10250.00. Sakai's share on the basis of his own valuation of \$350.00 will therefore be very little.

With reference to the net house for which Sakai makes a claim of \$50,00, and gear and nets in Unlulet for which his total claim is \$600,00, the net house was declared by Shotaro Sakai im 1942 to belong to him and also the gear and nets stored therein.

With reference to sale of the Fishing Vessel and the Power of Attorney signed by Essuichi Sakai in favour of Hideo Pukuyama, consideration should be given to the fact that Essuichi Sakai was a native-boxe Ganadiam, was apparently educated in Canada and twenty-seven years of age at the time of the Syacuation, Hideo Fultures, who died about two years ago and twenty-nine years of age at the time of the evacuation and was Hamaging Director of the Balance Hamaging Director of the Balance Hamaging Director of the Spoke Hamaging and Japanese. He was given special permission to remain in the Restricted Area as representative of the boat emers and after his evacuation, was permitted to return to carry on segetiations for other Japanese. As a matter of fact two other Japanese persons were allowed to remain to represent the best owners, the others being him, as officer of the Prince Report Fishing Company, and Enkance of Steventon. Under these circumstances is would seem unreasonable to republishe his Power of Attorney.

This man signed a declaration to the Custodian on August 8, 1942. He was evacuated on September 25, 1942.

The only property reported, other than the buildings which are dealt with in the Real Property Summary, was fishing gear and an old seine net stored in his net house at Ucluelet. Mr. H. G. Hinton's report of September 30, 1942, states that nothing was found in the net house or dwelling house, formerly occupied by this man.

An inventory, dated July 10, 1942, taken by Mr. Hinton shows that among goods stored at House No. 5, Ucluelet, were the following, identified as the property of Shotaro SAKAI, one box of irons, kitchenware, etc., one wringer, one pail fishing gear, one pail earthenware and one carton containing 2 large platters. The pail of fishing gear was sold in July, 1944 for \$1.25, which was credited to the account of Shotaro SAKAI. The file gives no further information in regard to the other chattels.

On September 23, 1942, SAKAI reported an oil stove, and oil tank, valued at \$80.00 left at Hastings Park Baggage Room. A Duo therm heater, identified as the property of this man, was sold on March 14, 1944, for the net sum of \$52.04. It appears likely that the tank was included with the stove in the sale, and the same is true of the carton of stove parts which, which according to undated, unsigned memorandum was stored at 992 Powell Street.

The articles sold on September 26, 1944, and credited to this account do not appear to be the property of this man. At any rate there is nothing on the file to indicate that these were his property, and the items sold do not appear to be consistent with the information available about this man. The net proceeds of this sale, \$3.07, will be transferred to Suspense Account unless some evidence comes to light to show that he is entitled to this money.

This file reveals no other personal property.
