GENERAL SUMMARY

RE: Koichiro MIYAZAKI, Reg. No. 02222

MIYAZAKI was interned on March 12/42. At the time he was interned he refused to give any particulars relative to his family, to declare any assets or to go to work camp. In the report we received from the R.C.M.P. they state that this man has frequently been a source of annoyance to them and that he is very pro-Japanese.

The first mention made of any goods by Koichiro MIYAZAKI is in his letter of P. b. 22/46 when he asks about his piano, refrigerator, washing machine, bed, chesterfield, coffee table and end table, etc. These were declared by the wife and were sold at auction and the proceeds credited to her account.


The radio which Koichiro enquires about is also dealt with on the file of his wife. This radio was shipped to them on March 5/45.

No property interests of any kind are therefore found on this file.

The above summary is certified to be in accordance with the information on file.

As shown in letter of January 18, 1945, this man has asked us to request Crone Storage to pack and ship a radio, belonging to him, which was left with Miss Mabel Armstrong, 118 West 11th Avenue, Vancouver. Neither Koichiro MIYAZAKI nor his wife, Yoshiko, #02229, File 13214, declared ownership of a radio, but on October 15, 1943, Miss Mabel Armstrong reported to this office that she had a radio belonging to Mrs. Miyazaki. This radio she said was a Philco mantel model.

In the case of radios that were not surrendered to the RCMP, where no reason for refusing shipment exists, we notify the owner that the Custodian has no objection to shipment being made, but he has to make his own arrangements for shipping.

In this case, there may be reasons for refusing permission.

1. Koichiro MIYAZAKI is a paroled Internee, residing in Montreal. He is a National and a former teacher in a Buddhist school. He was taken into custody on March 7, 1942, having refused to go to work camp, give any particulars regarding his family or authorize payment of a portion of his pay to his wife. The RCMP, at that time, reported that he was a source of annoyance and was very pro-Japanese. He was released from Internment on September 5, 1944.

2. His wife, Yoshiko, went from Slocan to Montreal in September, 1944. All the family chattels were declared by her, and her account has been credited with about \$180.00 from the sale of some of these, with an additional \$200.00 from a recent sale not yet transferred to her account. On September 15, 1942, Mrs. Miyazaki reported that she had approximately \$1,700.00 in cash. There is a nine year old daughter. A B.C.S.C. Statement of Assets form is on her file.

While the question of maintenance may not come into this picture, it has occurred to me that there may be objections to a Japanese National (and Buddhist teacher) having a short-wave radio in his possession in Montreal. Do you know of any restrictions in effect on the Atlantic Coast?

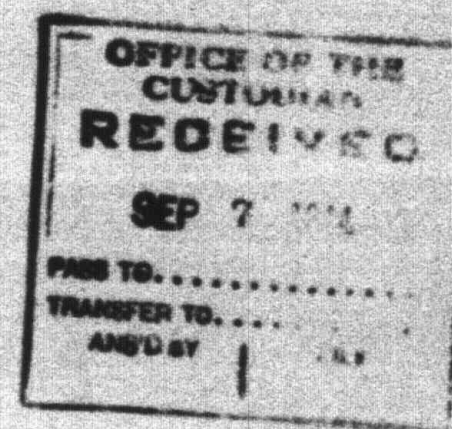

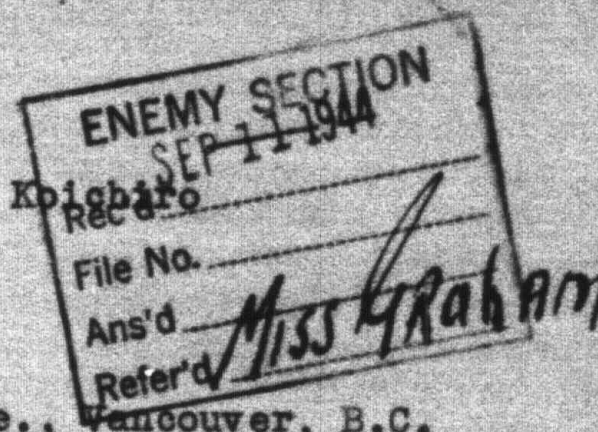

This will probably persuade Mrs. Miyasaki not to use it though of course if essential, we can find room for her things.

Re: P/W P-1232, Koichiro MIYAZAKI.

Attached hereto you will find copy of a memo I have made for the above file. Mrs. Miyasaki called today to say that she would be leaving for Japan in a few days and offered to leave the Passbooks for the two accounts, so I accepted, and Mrs. Miyasaki is to send us a letter as soon as she knows her date of departure.

As I understand it, these people are to be allowed about \$200.00 each and Mrs. Miyasaki has admitted carrying \$600.00 which will be more than allowance for her husband and herself. There is over \$1100.00 in the Bank and in view of suggestions made that those with a surplus are contributing to their countrymen who have not enough, it seems to me that it is our duty to safeguard the interests of the Government although they are not enemies until they board ship. The mere taking of the Passbook does not tie the account, but most of these people believe that without it funds may not be withdrawn. I do not suppose that we can go so far as to notify the Bank but as similar cases may arise I deem it advisable to bring this to your attention and you may determine whether the action is right or wrong. I would appreciate suggestions as to how much further we might go. I have given receipts for these books so that it will eventually come out and if any questions are asked by Ottawa, you will have the details.

1. On the 7th instant the above-named appeared before an Official of the Department of Labour at R.C.M. Police Barracks, as instructed, for evacuation from the Pacific Coast Defence Area. He stated he was not used to work as he was a teacher in a Buddhist school and refused to go to work camp; also refused to give particulars relative to his family, or sign a letter authorizing the payment of a portion of his pay to his wife, who resides at 154 West 5th Avenue, Vancouver.

2. As instructed, the writer removed this man to the Canadian Immigration Shed and delivered him to I/Sgt. G.W. Malholland, 1st Bn. R.M. Rangers, C.A. and received an receipt therefor. Certificate of Parole #135634 attached hereto.

FORWARDED: This man, you will note, refused to go to work camp, refused to give particulars regarding his family for the purpose of their financial care after his departure, and refused to sign an assignment of pay to his wife.

2. Certificate of Parole No. 135634 attached hereto, which gives particulars regarding his physical description.

3. This man, it might be stated, is known to this Office, and has frequently been a source of annoyance. He is a very pro-Japanese and his internment is recommended. You will note he is now held in custody under Military Guard at the Immigration Shed here, and receipt for his body is held on file. It is necessary from time to time to deal in this manner with some of these people, otherwise the situation will get entirely out of hand.
