East? or can Mr. Lee bring them to me when he returns on Monday.

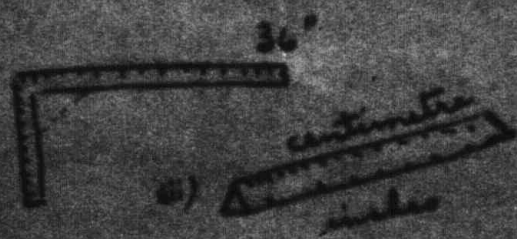

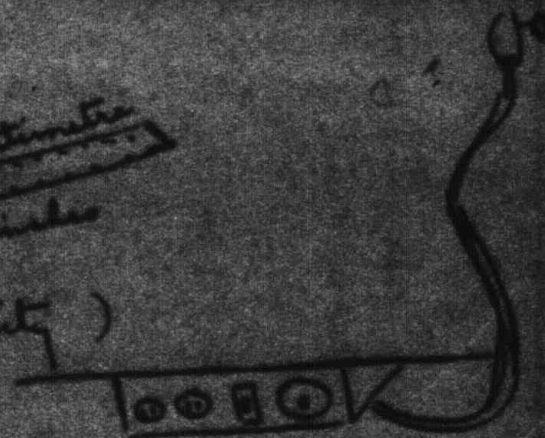
