Dear Sir:—

I thank you for the kindness of you to search for the gramophone. As a matter of fact the gramophone as I told you before was supposed of being shipped on the train, that is the C. P. R. but I think when we were leaving Vancouver to head to Greenwood on the 9th of May 1942, we received every other thing that we packed but only the gramophone was missing.

As it hasn't left at the former residence, I don't think for I was told that it was on the trunk to the station, so it must of being left there ^(they in your statement) for I think it wasn't packed right so if they never shipped it on the train, well anyway we never

received it. The men had time
to pack properly for me were
told to send it the next day. It
wasn't packed in the box or by
boards, it was only tied by ropes
it's one of those standing ones. It
has my name on it and
Greenwood B.C. and also Catholic
Japanese Mission on it so if by
any chance happen to find it please
let me know. Thank you.

Once again thanks for taking
the trouble and time for looking
for it.

Dear Madam:-

Thank you for your letter of December 7th enquiring about the gramophone you had in Vancouver which you have since not received. We are afraid it will be very difficult for us to do anything about this without more information. We have nothing on your file that will give us any assistance in tracing this gramophone but in reference to the file of your father, Mr. James Shimizu, we see that a large number of things were left at your former residence at 325 West 4th Avenue. These have all been moved to safe storage. We cannot, however, trace among them a gramophone or any package that might contain a gramophone.

If you can give us any more information as to just where or with whom the gramophone was left, we will do our best to investigate further.

Dear Sir,

Since I left Vancouver to head to
Greenwood I had a gramophone and I
had it packed (was so good) when I arrived
there the gramophone didn't come. All
other things did but except it. I thought
to myself then that it wasn't packed right
so that they didn't ship it but I don't
know. I wonder if you by any chance
have it. I presume it was shipped on
the train for my other things were.
The woman packed it very good for we
didn't have time. She had a very short
notice she was told to leave on the 9th
and they told us on the 8th. It had my
name on it and it's tied with some
ropes and lots of cloth stuffed inside
so as to prevent the rattling. I think
it was worth around \$10.00 then.
