PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

Chattels:

The above Japanese person filled in and signed our form J card under date of March 17, 1943, certifying that she had no property of any kind whatsoever in any protected area of British Columbia, but a review of this file reveals a memo dated May 22, 1944, by Mr. Iverson which states that Mrs. Nakamura left some personal effects at the rear of 1011 Royal Avenue, New Westminster, B.C.

On investigating these premises in the presence of Mrs. Nakamura it was found they had been entered by persons unknown and all boxes and cabinets ransacked and everything of value taken. In addition, the roof leaked causing damage to furniture of any value. All articles considered of some value were salvaged in Mrs. Nakamura's presence and taken to our Auction Rooms for sale.

The original agents for this property, Messrs. McIntosh & Company were notified of the situation found there and they admitted not having investigated before but said they would inform the police.

On May 3rd, 1944, New Westminster Auction No. 12 was held and at which the sum of \$19.78 was realized for Mrs. Nakamura's chattels.

One convertible Studio Couch was shipped to Mrs. Nakamura, at Tashme, by Consolidated Truck on May 24th, 1944, all charges being paid direct by Mrs. Nakamura.

The above sum of \$19.78 is being held to the credit of Mrs. Nakamura's account with the Custodian.

Dear Madam:

We are in receipt of your letter of the 15th instant and note your agreement to pay the \$4.50 claim of Dr. J. E. Harrison's, which we have now done. This leaves you with a credit balance of \$15.28 and as requested a cheque for this amount is now enclosed.

You are already aware of the circumstances attached to the sale of your chattels, from which the above funds were derived. These chattels, not declared by you, were removed in your presence from the rear of 1011 Royal Avenue, New Westminster, B. C., and taken to our auction rooms for sale, resulting in net proceeds of \$19.78 after allowing for auctioneering fees and other expenses.

Your studio couch was shipped to you on May 24th, 1944, all charges involved being paid by you.

The above accounts for all the chattels that came into our possession and as there is nothing else on your file for which we have to account your file is now being closed, together with your account.

MEMORANDUM

May 22, 1944.

To: Mr. Green

From: Mr. Iverson

Re: NAKAMURA, Mrs. Shigeo

Mrs. NAKAMURA called at the office today asking for information regarding effects left, she alleges, at the rear of 1011 Royal Avenue. The house in question is a small building which had been completely boarded up and doors fastened by her husband. It was entered in her presence and everything there found in disorder. The back door had been forced and persons unknown had apparently gone through every box and cabinet and everything of value taken away. In addition the roof had leaked badly causing the veneer to peel off any furniture of value. The whole picture can be described as a wreck.

Whatever there was of value was salvaged in Mrs. NAKAMURA's presence and taken down to our Auction Rooms for sale.

Reference to the file shows that no chattels were declared and this was pointed out to Mrs. NAKAMURA.

Messrs. McIntosh and Company, the original agents on this property were notified of the situation found, they admitted not having investigated before but said they would notify the Police.
