ALFRED, in letter of September 25, 1942, denied owing claim No. 8. He stated he had read the last statement, P. H. Smith & Sons, who are handling the affairs of ALFRED, who was advised on September 25, 1942, and given ALFRED's address to deal direct.

PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

January 6, 1948.

Re: Hisaji AIHOSHI, Reg. No. 08908

This man was interned on December 16, 1941. He was released and evacuated on December 22, 1942. He did not sign a declaration to the Custodian.

CHATELS

Prior to his evacuation, AIHOSHI operated a shoe repair store in Duncan. The store equipment, fixtures, etc. were sold to Storey & Campbell for \$325.00, and the proceeds were used to settle AIHOSHI's liabilities on a pro rata basis.

Some articles of household furniture and effects were sold at Duncan Auction #3 for the net sum of \$61.40. These articles had been declared by Mrs. AIHOSHI.

For full particulars regarding chattels see Chattel Summary and Schedule.

BOND

On February 17, 1942, a \$50.00 Victory Bond, the property of AIHOSHI, was received from the R. C. M. P. In accordance with AIHOSHI's instructions, this bond was sold and the proceeds credited to his account. Interest amounting to forty-three cents and interest on the coupons amounting to \$1.50 was also credited to the account.

BANK ACCOUNT

In answer to our request, the Bank of Montreal, Duncan, advised us on January 29, 1942, that AIHOSHI had a Savings Account at that Bank in the amount of \$83.16 in his own name and a Current Account of fifty-three cents in the name of the Tojo Shoe Repair Shop. On April 27, 1942, a cheque covering these amounts was received from the Bank, less twenty-three cents exchange and excise tax. This cheque was credited to AIHOSHI's account.

INSURANCE

The R. C. M. P. reported dated December 19, 1941, states that AIHOSHI carried a life insurance policy with the Monarch Life Assurance Company for \$1,000.00 and one with the Manufacturers Life Insurance Company for \$500.00. These policies were obtained from the Police and placed in Custodian safe-keeping. They were sent to AIHOSHI on January 5, 1948.

CHATTAL SUMMARY

File No. 13823

January 7, 1948.

Re: HIRSHI AIHOSHI, Reg. No. 08908

No declaration of his chattels was received from AIHOSHI in spite of several attempts on our part to obtain one.

Prior to his internment, AIHOSHI operated a shoe repair store in Duncan. The R. C. M. P. report on AIHOSHI, dated December 19, 1941, states that AIHOSHI rented the store and living quarters behind the store, and that the furniture was worth about \$500.00 and the equipment, stock, etc. was worth about \$2,000.00. However, on April 29, 1942, a report was received from Harold Hinton to which was attached an inventory of the fixtures, machinery, stock, etc. of the store. The total estimated realizable value of the goods was stated to be \$965.90. No household furniture was mentioned in the report.

On May 8, 1942, J. H. Whittome & Co. Ltd., Duncan, advised that an offer of \$200.00 had been received from James Critchley of Duncan for all that remained on the premises at which AIHOSHI's store was located. A letter confirming this offer was received from Critchley on June 17, 1942.

However, the business was offered for sale as a going concern by J. H. Whittome & Co. Ltd., the notice of sale being inserted in the Duncan paper, tenders to close June 26, 1942. A letter from the Internment Camp received June 29, 1942, states that AIHOSHI was perfectly satisfied with whatever arrangements might be made. Only two tenders for the business were received, one for \$200.00 and one for \$250.00. Neither of these was accepted, and negotiations were carried on with Storey & Campbell (AIHOSHI's biggest creditor) who ultimately brought the shoe repair equipment for \$325.00. We did try to get Storey & Campbell to increase the price but they refused to offer a larger sum for the equipment. The Bill of Sale covering this transaction appears on file under date of September 10, 1942.

AIHOSHI's liabilities amounted to \$900.15 so these claims were settled on a pro rata basis from the funds received from the sale, with the exception of the Printing Company, the name of which was not known. All creditors had agreed to accept settlement on this basis.

(It is noted in letter of July 30, 1942, that AIHOSHI was not satisfied with the sale price of \$325.00 but would leave everything in the Custodian's hands.)

On January 30, 1946, the sum of \$61.40 was credited to the account of AIHOSHI. These funds represented the proceeds of the auction sale of household effects sold at Duncan Auction #3. These proceeds had erroneously been credited to File 244 instead of to AIHOSHI, whose file number at that time was Int. 244. These goods were not declared by AIHOSHI but the larger articles sold agree with those declared by Mrs. AIHOSHI, File 8608. These funds were remitted to Mr. and Mrs. AIHOSHI in a joint cheque on January 7, 1948.







MEMORANDUM

Attached hereto please find original and three copies of a Bill of Sale in favour of Storey & Campbell Limited, covering the purchase of the goods of the above named who formerly carried on a shoe repair shop at Duncan, B. C.

The business was advertised for sale by tender in June last and only two tenders were submitted - the higher being for \$250.00. Following negotiations, we received an offer from Storey and Campbell for \$325.00 which was accepted and their cheque has been received for the full amount.

The liabilities exceeded \$800.00 so that it was necessary to dispose of the assets. The creditors were informed of the offer and accepted settlement.

We communicated with the Internee and the letter from the Camp Commandant under date of July 30th is as follows -

"The P/W is not satisfied with the said price of \$325.00. However, he will leave everything in the Custodian's hands."



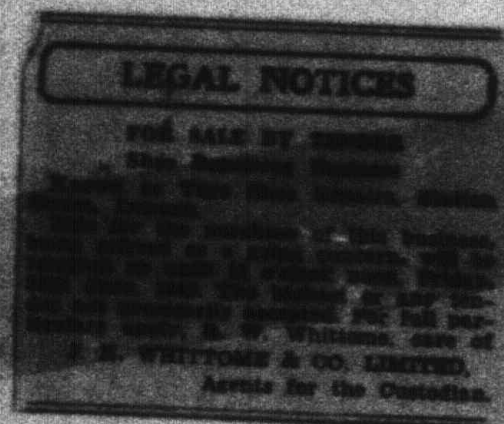

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th instant (your File No. 244 - Legal Section), and to thank you for the report therein contained on the affairs of Internee Hisaji AIHOSHI.

Will you please be so kind as to notify us if there are any assets available for the support of this internee's family after the payment of his debts.

It is noted that, upon Mrs. Aihoshi's visit to your office on June 6th, you handed her a cheque for \$20.00 and suggested that she should apply for relief at once. Apparently, Mrs. Aihoshi failed to tell you that she was already in receipt of assistance.

On March 23rd, 1942, the following scale of relief was approved for this internee's family:

Food . . . . . \$25.65 a month;  
Allowances for shelter, clothing  
fuel, light and water, and such  
casual expenditures for medical  
services as may be necessary, pro-  
vided that same are not in excess  
of the scale of relief applicable  
to general relief cases in the  
community.

On April 14th, the Administrator of the Unemployment Relief Branch of the Department of Labour, in Victoria, advised us that an account had been received from the City of Duncan, B.C., for the month of March showing that the amount agreed upon, \$25.65, was issued for that month, and that it was assumed that it would be in order to continue the payment of relief until such time as the investigation to be made by the Custodian's Representative had been completed.

Internment Operations are to-day informing the Provincial Authorities of the issue of the cheque for \$20.00 to Mrs. Aihoshi, in order that this amount may be budgeted against the assistance she is receiving from the Municipality of Duncan.

Under existing regulations, necessitous dependents of an internee may apply for assistance to the Municipal Authorities of the district in which they are residing, and, if they are found to be eligible for relief, it is granted upon the same scale as that supplied to general relief cases in the community. In this way there is no danger of any dependents suffering undue hardship owing to the internment of the head of the family.

Could the Custodian, before making payments to such dependents, ascertain whether they are in receipt of relief, thus obviating the necessity of making adjustments with the Relief Authorities at a later date?

Personal Property:

I attach a Schedule to show details of the machinery, tools, fixtures and stock on hand at the date of examination. It was necessary for my investigators to break open the premises. They left the back door and windows boarded up and the front door padlocked, and the keys are in my possession. The values shown in the Schedule are estimated realizable values and have been conservatively taken. If the business were sold as a going concern it should realize approximately \$1,500.00

Insurance:

There does not appear to be any insurance coverage.

Liabilities:

It was ascertained that the water and electric light bills had been paid to date, but that rent was owing to J. H. Whittome & Co. Ltd., Duncan, B. C., from 1st October 1941 at \$20.00 per month.

A letter was found on the premises from The Duncan District Credit Bureau representing Doctors Bissett, Watson, McHaffie & Beaver-Potts, asking payment of a bill amounting to \$102.50.



Liabilities: (continued)

Enquiries were made from the Police and Bank Managers with regard to other liabilities but none could be discovered.

No books of account or records of accounts receivable could be found on the premises.

Recommendations:

I recommend that the business be advertised for sale as a going concern to realize approximately \$1,500.00 or best offer, that fire insurance coverage for \$1,500.00 be arranged for, and that the landlord's claim and other liabilities be satisfied from the sales proceeds. 

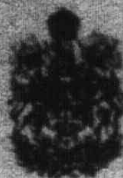

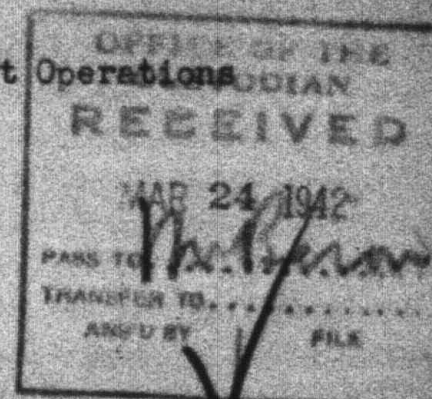

He is 33 years old and operates a shoe repair store in Duncan, B.C. His p.o. box number is 154. He is married and his wife, Yone, and four children, the eldest of whom is 5, reside in the quarters at the rear of his shop.

2. This man has been interviewed by the undersigned in an effort to obtain information as to his assets etc which might prove of assistance to the Custodian of Enemy Alien Property in the administration of his affairs.

3. Aihoshi operates a savings and current account with the Bank of Montreal in Duncan but has no idea of the balance of either account. Both are under his name. He has no safety deposit box.

4. He has a \$50. Victory bond fully paid at his home. He carries a life insurance policy with the Monarch Life (\$1000.) which he has had for about six years and another with the Manufacturers Life (\$500.) which he has had for about 17 years although he has paid no premiums on this latter policy for several years.

5. Subject has no car. He rents the store and living quarters. The furniture is worth about \$500. and the equipment and stock etc. in the store is worth about \$2000.

6. He has a certain amount of credits on the store books and acknowledges the following outstanding debts.

7. There will also be an outstanding account with some calendar manufacturer, the name of whom the subject cannot recall, for his 1942 calendars. The amount of this bill will be \$25.

8. An effort will be made at a later date to verify the information contained above with the cooperation of the local representative of the Custodian of Enemy Alien Property.
