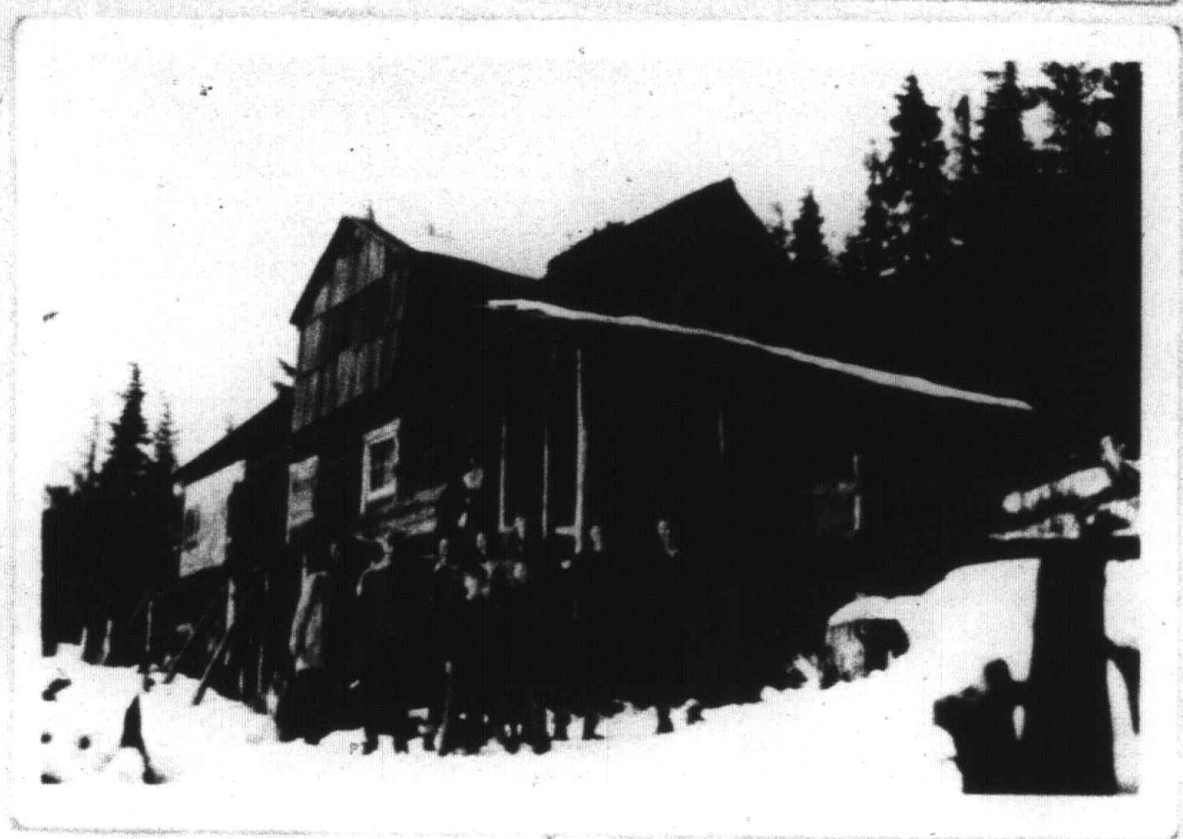

Copy: MINUTE of the Meeting of the
Fuji Ski Club - Jan. 29/49.

The meeting was called to order by Toshio Otori taking the chair. Following were present: Sam Nagino, "Gup" Inamoto, Bill & Bob Yasui, Tom & Frank Natanaka, Yosh Kagawa, Miss Tomie Mizuzawa, Edgar Iwanoto, Ke Ebizaki, T. Sawada, Kiyo Inouye, Toshio Otori, M. Takasaki, Nideo Mochikawa of all of Toronto. Mr. H. Royama & J. Deshima (Miss) were also present from Hamilton.

A short speech was given by Mr. Otori outlining the present position of the Fuji Ski Club, and because Kay Takuchi passed away during the vacation, Mr. Otori read the last meeting's minute & the final financial report. These were adopted by Sam Nagino & seconded by Tom Natanaka.

After a brief discussion the following officers were elected unanimously: Buo Otori president, proposed by Bob Yasui, seconded by Sam Nagino; Tom Natanaka secretary-treasurer, proposed by J. Inamoto, seconded by Bob Yasui; Bill Yasui ~~prop~~ corresponding secretary, proposed by T. Natanaka seconded by K. Inouye.

Owing to business Buo Otori could not take on more responsibility than chairmanship of the meetings.

Tom Hatanaka was delegated to contact the crest-odian, & other skiing organization, if that situation ever came up. Bill Yasui was authorized to contact all members of the club. These resolutions were moved by Sam Hagino & seconded by Bob Yasui. Because of his personal associations with the JCCA Sam Hagino volunteered to contact that body because of a report that they were trying to sponsor a ski-club as one of their activities. This was accepted unanimously & was ordered to be entered in the minutes by Bus Olov.

After a lengthy discussion, continuance of the Fuji Ski Club in Toronto was quashed for the time being, as only 7 of those present were engaged in active skiing. These active skiers, which must form a nucleus for a reorganized club were more favorable to skiing on their own or to join such existing organization as the Toronto Ski Club; the chief reason being that skiing conditions ~~being~~ ^{were} entirely different from those that existed in Vancouver, & the poor ski season this winter.

As to the assets of the Fuji Ski Club, 3 possibilities were discussed:

Mr. G. W. MacPherson attended a meeting of the Advisory Committee on May 17th. He outlined the situation in regard to the tenders received on the above property and pointed out that Mr. Durkin had stated that the Committee recommended that both offers should be rejected. Both the Chairman, Mr. Justice Smith, and Alderman Jones were quite emphatic that Mr. Quakenbush, the tenant, should be advised that his offer was acceptable. Alderman Jones specifically stated that this was in line with the City's own policy of giving the tenant the chance to buy if he was willing to meet any other price offered.

It will, therefore, be in order for you to accept Mr. Quakenbush's tender, and I would suggest that you simply advise Lieutenant Dewar that his offer has been considered and is not acceptable, and return his cheque.

Respecting the attached Memo from Mr. Wright and the discussion yesterday afternoon with Mr. MacPherson, as arranged I saw Mr. Durkee who informed me that he is not putting this matter up to the Advisory Committee, neither does he intend to do so. His last words to me were that he would wish to be clear of the matter, and his file would not indicate any decision on his part.

His reason for this position apparently was that as the Cabin had been offered for Public Tender, in line with the Committee's normal practice, each of the equal bidders should be given the opportunity of making fresh offers, the award going to the ultimate highest bidder. Mr. Durkee said, however, that if we felt justified in selling the Cabin to Quakenbush in view of the special circumstances of this case (and we were of the opinion that we would not be criticised for so doing in the event of the facts becoming known), he had no objection.

I pointed out to Mr. Durkee that Quakenbush, the tenant of the Cabin for two years, had paid Patrol Fees of \$10.00 per year for two years, and was also paying the insurance premium on the Cabin. I further mentioned that Quakenbush had done quite a bit of repairs to the Cabin and looked after it generally, and had recently got us two independent valuations on the odd skiing equipment which we wish to sell. I mentioned that I appreciated Quakenbush had had the use of the Cabin for two years, but all things considered Messrs. Shears and Wright, and myself, felt that Quakenbush should be awarded the decision. As instructed, I refrained from mentioning Mr. MacPherson's views.

It was finally left with us to make the decision and I inferred to Mr. Durkee that we would favour Quakenbush.

A Mr. Arthur E. Langley whose address is care of R. C. A. F., No. 2 Equipment Depot, Chestnut Street, Vancouver, B. C. —Telephone Bay. 7810 - Local 10— (who knew T. Ohori quite well and who has been referred to in correspondence by this Japanese), telephoned this morning as Mr. Quakenbush had requested him to have a word with us regarding this Cabin.

Mr. Langley pointed out that but for the work that had been done by Mr. Quakenbush in keeping the Cabin in repair, etcetra, the same would have been condemned by the Ski Patrol and demolished this year, as it was in very bad shape. His view is that the whole Cabin, including the very crude furniture in same, is not worth more than \$100.00 at the outside, and he advised that he himself would not pay this figure for same.

He mentioned that his own Cabin on Grouse Mountain, which is almost new, is only insured for \$250.00.

In the circumstances it does appear that we certainly must reconsider insuring this property for \$500.00 and the furniture and equipment for \$500.00, and nothing should be done in the matter until we hear from Mr. Quakenbush next week as he spends most weekends at the Cabin.
